



HYDRO now serves 313,285 rural customersmore than double the 156,000 served at the end of the war-bringing electricity and a better way of living to an additional 157,285 Ontario farm, hamlet and village customers.

At the end of the war there were 21,569 miles of rural lines bringing electricity to the rural areas of Ontario. By September, 1951 the miles of line had increased to 37,239. During this period the horsepower demand in the rural areas showed a remarkable increase. The demand at war's end was 132,551 horsepower. By 1950 it had more than doubled to a total of 314,681 horsepower.

James N. Allan, Progressive-Conservative Candidate in the Provincial Election yesterday, won by a wide margin over his Liberal and C.C.F. opponents.

About 66 percent of the eligible electors in the riding went to the polls to record a total of 22,022 votes which was 1072 more than were cast in the last Provincial election. Of these the winner polled 11,362. Elmo Riddle, the Liberal Candidate polled 8,907 and Carroll Lindsay received 1,753 for the C.C.F. The results gave Mr. Allan a plurality of 702
