We'll admit our record on the wagon hasn't been too hot. We stayed on only a few days when the price went up from 20 to 25 cents or so. We put in a better showing on each successive rise and feel we now are in a position to cock a snoot at Mr. Abbott and the tobacco manufacturer.

They say there's a possibility that the cigarette taxes will be cut next spring when the budget is brought down, but that sort of pie in the sky won't weaken our resolution. We're taking that \$146.00 we spent on cigarettes last year and putting it into something useful like a new easy chair, or maybe a radio.

There'll be a lot of others of the same mind and we've no doubt that the Ontario Tobacco Growers, along with the vestible roof, installing a ready concern about decreased consumption of cigarettes, will be moved to further protest of the tax burden.

The Government is now taking 25c on every 40 cent package and the tobacco men think it's too much.

We'll let them fight it out, and stick to our new fool-proof no-light, etc., no-tax system. What's that? You want to know what the system is? Well, if you keep it quiet, it's the tobacco from friends visiting the States — duty free!
