James N. Allan Will Contest Haldimand-Norfolk For P.C.'s

James N. Allan, of Dunnville, one of Haldimand's best known citizens, was chosen at the Progressive Conservative nominating convention, held at Jarvis Monday night, to contest the riding of Haldimand-Norfolk on behalf of the party at the Provincial election on November 22nd.

An overflow attendance at the nominating convention indicated a wide interest in the selection of a candidate and the address of Hon. G. H. Donnelly, Minister of Highways who spoke following the closing of nominations.
