The big aerial search for two men missing on a flight in Northern Ontario spread this week to adjoining Quebec areas and farther North. Bill Barilko, defenceman of the Toronto Maple Leafs hockey team and Dr. Henry Hudson had been missing since August 26th when they failed to complete a return flight from James Bay to their homes in Timmins after a fishing trip.

Royal Canadian Air Force officials have shifted the main search headquarters from North Bay to Kapuskasing and four long-range Lancaster planes were added to the aerial search force. Pil. Lt. G. J. Ruston, directing the search, said Dr. Hudson was piloting the small yellow airplane might have turned back because of bad weather and possibly their plane was blown northwards from Rupert House.

A close scrutiny continued however of the area between Rupert House and Timmins, dotted with lakes on which the two may have been able to make a forced landing. Indians in canoes have already scoured many miles of the shore of James Bay.
