It is very seldom we find ourselves at variance with any views expressed by the Grand River Schemer. However, the suggestion in an editorial this week that the County Council will have to be approached for approval of the plan to build a Central School is contrary to our understanding of the authority of the West Haldimand High School Board. The Schemer further states that "as our understanding is that they (the County Council) will be the ones to supply the money." We personally refuse to believe that the "Schemer" has gone over to that school of thought that elected bodies give away anything—especially money and we hasten, therefore, to point out that the County Council will not supply the money to build a new school—it will be the taxpayers. Furthermore we would personally be extremely

regretful to learn that the County Council will attempt to have anything to say about the matter—unless, of course, they go all the way and assume all responsibilities in the construction with the administration of educational matters now carried by the West Haldimand High School Board.

One of the things we can agree with the Schemer on and that is the question whether or not a new Central School and also maintaining the school at Caledonia will meet the

problem before the Board. Regardless of what step is taken time may prove it to have been the wrong one. However, that is the responsibility that has been given to an appointed Board and the taxpayers will either suffer or profit by their decisions in the years ahead. Certainly there has not been any outward evidence of public concern over this vital matter of providing adequate High School accommodation so it can only be assumed that the public has complete confidence in what ever action the Board decides to take.

The big land deal south of Simcoe still remains a mystery. Almost every conceivable possibility has been explored to try and find out what is going to happen—if anything. We have it on reliable authority, however, that the Reynolds Tobacco Co. (which it was rumored was going to build a tobacco plant and sell cigarettes for 20¢ per package) is not now considered a possibility.
