Selkirk Lose To Beeton In Finals

Selkirk Fishermen lost their chance for the O.R.H.A. Intermediate A championship on Monday evening when they dropped in a 4-0 decision to Beeton in the Burlington Arena. Playing the first period without the services of Cox Weaver, Selkirk got off to a shaky start as Beeton pumped in four goals past Vern Weaver who appeared to be off form in the early part of the game. Campbell opened the scoring for Beeton at 1:23 when he broke away from the pack and got by Vokes who fell when he attempted to turn. Hopper and Norton drew assists on the play. Dan Kearns was chased for hooking at 5:35 followed by Norton at 7:54 for freeing the puck. However the penalty backed away and Selkirk Doug Miller broke away and banked a shot into the net at 8:37. Bill Murray made 1:31 to 0 at 12:32 unassisted and when Bob Lindsay was chased for hooking at 13:05, Beeton added another goal. Selkirk was chased for hooking at 17:36 for hooking but no damage was done while he was off.

Selkirk were much improved in the second period as they held Beeton to one goal and scored twice. Glen Weaver was thumped for a foul and scored at 4:48 when he was left unchecked in front of the goal. Campbell scored early in the third, Nichol from Campy, at the 47 second mark, two seconds later, Hedges was chased for tripping but Selkirk weathered the storm despite the fact that Cox Weaver was chased for cross checking Norton at 1:50. O. Leary was waved off for hooking at 4:20 and while he was off, Cox Weaver scored on a shot from C. Cox and Kindy. O. Leary was chased for hooking at 10:30 and Hedges raised the Selkirk hopes at 10:47 when his high shot from the blue line bounced over the Beeton's shoulder. Norton was sent off for interference at 10:50 and O. Leary for hooking at 11:44. Cliff Weaver put Selkirk in better position and Henry Hedges, the latter being the same gentleman and soldier who about seven years later was to lead the company of Norfolk Volunteers which descended on the enemy gathered in the Dunham Cabin on the evening 13th of November, 1913.

The game was marked by a couple of incidents that happened in the interval. Dunham had probably been a traitor from being a loyal supporter of the Crown, and when he was more aware of this about face than Colonel Bostwick, himself.

The foregoing information enables us to place the site of the Dunham cabin and the battle of Nanticoke in the present Standard Vokes farm, a fact which is well known by the present day residents of that locality.

But who was Tuttle? A close friend of Dunham's, no doubt, and those two rascals would be included in the enemy forces to completely routed by Bostwick.

By chance the writer discovered that Tuttle had been a member of the from the Crown in 1802 and 1803, of lot number 18, in the first concession of Walpole, and whose property would be approximately four miles east of the present Standard Vokes farm, a fact which is well known by the present day residents of that locality.

There is no question as to the utter disloyalty of Tuttle, as his lands were subsequently forfeited to the Crown under an Act passed by the Province of Upper Canada vesting in the Commissioners and Trustees of the Fortified Estates the lands of Traitors and applying the proceeds therefrom towards the composition of the which His Majesty's Subjects had suffered during the War of 1812-14. The Commissioners sold the lot number 18 to Squire Edward Evans, of Rainham Township, on April 18th, 1840. A part of this lot has remained in the Evans family for a period of 120 years. Har old Evans, son of the late Chancery Evans, and a direct descendant of the Squire, being the present owner.

Among the loyal subjects who assisted in ferrying out the rascals, being the present owner, of the lot number 18, was a man named White Peter, whose home was on the west bank of the Nanticoke River, within a mile of the Dunham cabin. It is recalled that he received great praise for warning the Commissioners of the Canadian Forces in the area from imminent dangers they awaited them, and was in fact excited for saving their lives at the risk of losing his own. It is within the realm of possibility that it was of course conjecture only that it was from the lips of White Peter that Colonel Bostwick, at the time of his visit to the North, received information that a party of brigands mentioned in the letter, was in the neighbourhood.

This sketch leaves many questions unanswered, but it does the writer trust, give an inkling of the intrigue and treachery that prevailed at the time of the battle of Nanticoke. History was being written in Walpole as well as at Queenston Heigh during those trying times in Canada's history.

Perhaps some day a replica of the Dunham cabin will be erected at or near its original site as an historical Memorial to commemorate this chapter.

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Haldimand M.P. Expresses Concern Over Lost Markets

Growing concern over dwindling markets for Canada's Agricultural products and fears about unmarketable surplus are expressed in the House of Commons at Ottawa, a few days ago by Earl Catherswood, M.P. for Haldimand.

He suggested that Canada divert millions of dollars in defence orders to Britain as a means for the United Kingdom to purchase Canadian by-products, such as cheese, tobacco and apples. Mr. Catherswood urged Hon. C. D. Howe, Minister of Trade and Commerce and of Defence Production to send officials or go himself, to Britain with this proposal.

"Action in this regard, I don't think should any longer wait," he said. "The Department of National Defence to make up its mind on the question of Arms standards."

Mr. Catherswood said that Canada's most staple market for agriculture has been for many years been the United Kingdom, but that many of these had been lost today. "Unless some thing is done immediately to rehabilitate these markets, or find new ones, the entire agricultural economy of this country will be seriously threatened," he said.

He repeated the demand for a committee to be set up to study the situation. He also suggested Canada's participation in the possibility of shipping meats from Australia and New Zealand to the U.S. and replacing it with comparable quantities from Canada as a means of circumventing the U.S. embargo on meat from Canada.

"No one expects the government to do everything, but the farmers of this country expect them to do something," he concluded.
