Dear Laird:

I would like to refer to the "Test Your Intelligence" section in the June 19th issue of the Record. I find these rather interesting and educational. I was, however, surprised not to see a mention of our American friends by referring to Stoney Creek, Lundy's Lane, etc. This may be very well for the tourist trade, but to go so far as to say that the U.S. won the war seems to me a gross insult to the memory of those British and Canadian troops who so successfully resisted the aggression of a much larger number of American forces.

The actual records of history usually are polite enough to say that neither side was victorious since neither actually gained anything. If we follow this mode of reasoning, the Allies can not be considered to have won either of the two World Wars, and the U.N. forces in Korea can never literally win because they seek no material or territorial gains. We say that the Allies won both wars; not because they actually gained anything they did not have before but because they preserved their independence and freedom against the aggression of a foreign power. Is that not actually what the Canadians vaded Canada with the sole aim of conquering her; the Canadian, and British forces drove them back across the border, thus accomplishing what the Allies accomplished in both World Wars; namely the preservation of our British freedom.

If such things as these are not considered sacred by the people of this country, then let us throw away our glorious past.

I do not write this Laird, in any of the hope of clearing up this question for any other of your readers, but may have believed that the U.S. actually was the victor.

HOTEL JARVIS CHANGES HANDS

The Hotel Jarvis has been sold to Mr. Fred Moulton, of Port Talhoose who took over operation of the Hotel last Friday. Mr. Charles Grant has been proprietor of the Hotel since September 1949 when he purchased it from W. R. Slack. Mr. and Mrs. Moulton plan to move to Jarvis early in July.

NON RESIDENT PUPILS POSE AS PROBLEM FOR SCHOOL BOARD

The June meeting of the Board of Education was held on Tuesday evening, June 24th in the Secretary's Office, with Gordon Haslett, Chairman, presiding.

The item on the business discussed was the proposed altering of the boundaries of the school section to take in the non-resident students attending the Jarvis Public School. At the present time the school only takes in the non-resident students who live in the section. The Board has decided to have a charge a non-resident school fee, in accordance with Section 90 of the Public School Act, of approximately \$7.00 per pupil per month, unless the boundaries of the school section can be changed to take in the section where the pupils normally reside. Most of these non-resident pupils attending the Jarvis School come from school sections in adjacent townships and some here because of the shorter distance to the school.

The land directly concerned with the alteration consists of eight Jarvis acres, in the Township of Rainham, in the County of Haldimand. The usual procedure in such a case is for the Board of Education to draw up a petition which is then presented to the land owners in question. The ceremony was performed by the land owners in the presence of the Board of Education and the Township Council.
