

Ordinary Plain-Jane red clay flowerpots now can be turned into decorative spots of bright color in a few seconds. All you have to do is to dress them up in some of the clever new jackets of vinylite plastic sheeting, made especially for

Hazards in Fabrics A doctor wearing a woolen suit can create a dangerous charge by rising from a stool covered with artificial leather. Synthetic fabrica (nylon or rayon), frequently used in nurses' uniforms, have a strong tendency to "manufacture" static electricity, the bureau found.

The bureau suggested that floors, shoes, covers and other materials used be such that static charges will be dissipated. Cotton gowns and uniforms avoid the danger of building up a charge. Simple expedients, such as spreading wet towels on the floor and touching them to the bases of operating tables and anothering applies. tables and anesthesia machin were recommended to those work-ing in old operating rooms.


