ELM—White, Red, Rock .14 inches CHERRY-Red, Black 8 inches BIRCH-White, Gray, Black .. 10 inches ASH-White, Black ..... ...14 inches BASSWOOD, CHESTNUT, COFFEE, CUCUMBER, GUM, HACKBERRY, SYCA-MORE, HEMLOCK, & TULIP .....12 inches

CEDAR-White, Red ...... 2. Where in the opinion of the Trees Conserva-tion Committee special circumstances exist which warrant the cutting of trees under the size hereinbefore mentioned, the said Commit-tee may authorize the cutting of the undersize


