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
JARVIS, ONTARIO



A model of the old Town Hall clock tower of Preston, England, was a unique Canadian Pacific Express shipment aboard the Empress of France when she docked at Saint John, N.B. recently. The model, which moved in the custody of Chief Bedroom Steward William C. Hartley (far right), a native of Preston, is now travelling throughout Canada and the United States, and is being displayed in the city halls of many of the major cities. With it is an illuminated scroll on which all ex-Prestonians are asked to sign their names. The clock tower, carved from the original timbers of the old structure which was destroyed by fire in 1947, is a symbol of the Preston Guild celebrations which, with the exception of the war years, have been held every 20 years for the last 400 years.
