THE IAIL BREAKS, robberies and gun fights which marked the bloody career of Toronto's notorious Boyd Gang — and the reaction to them of certain sections of the public show a vicious pattern that could possibly lead to a nationwide crime wave of unparalleled violence, according to Mayor Allan A. Lamport, of Toronto, writing in the current issue of Mac

In an impassioned plea for a tougher atti-tude by the public and judical and penal systems towards the proved criminal, and more solid backing up of the nation's police forces, he strongly criticises unguarded banks which leave large sums of money "lying around" in branch offices, the conditions that lead to inefficiency in prisons, and the gullibility of clergymen among others - who are taken in by the earnest assurances of criminals who say they are "turning over a new leaf."

Lamport says in Maclean's: "I am satisfied that justice has now been done (to the Boyd Gang). I am not satisfied that justice has been done as swiftly, as safely and as economically as it should have been done. I am not satisfied with the performance of such supposedly responsible institutions and individuals as banks, clergymen, prison officials and law ad-ministration in this life-and-death struggle against terrorism. I am proud of the way the police protected society, but I am ashamed of most parts of Canada soft and lazy attitudes toward the professional criminal have become a pressing threat to our traditions as a law-abid-

ing nation." Crimes like armed robbery have increased more than two hundred and fifty percent in the last two decades in Canada, he notes in the article, and for an action picture of ourselves in five or ten years we can look at the United States. Because of the lessons the Boyd Gang taught Toronto, the mayor says he is assured that justice - in Ontario, at least - will be administered in future more on the lines of the British system: swift and sure. ---0---
