HARD-LUCK STATE --

IT SEEMS TO BE a natural law that certain minimum of hard luck is the lot of every mortal, no matter how good his intentions or how careful his planning. At times it seems that planning to avoid bad luck in one form is an invitation for it to arrive in another, as when a man who adheres to all the rules of healthful iving is knocked down by a reckless driver.

The universal liability to hard luck is one explanation for the universal impulse of sympathy for those whom hard luck oppresses. Just as some receive more than a natural minimum of hard luck, some give more than an average quota of sympathy. Some admirable citizens will contribute to the aid of the unfortunate, but will refuse to help in cases where the misfortune is evidently the result of crime, folly or stupidity on the part of the sufferer. Others, perhaps more admirable, will give whenever they are asked, without inquiry into the probability of the hard luck story. Some reserve their benevolence for those of their own country. Others contribute to foreign missions

If it be admitted that all these givers have the right to their own points of view, and need account only to their own consciences for the principles on which they do their giving, the fallacy that underlies the welfare state becomes The principle of the welfare state. which might better be called the hard-luck state is to tax everyone to provide against hard luck, deserved or undeserved. The squandering of taxes on the undeserving (including the thousands of job-holders for whom government charity primarily exists) reduces what the charitable an afford to give to deserving causes that appeal to their special sympathies.

In the long run the philosophy of the hardluck state leads to an increase in the minimum of hard-luck for everybody and a decrease in the amounts that the charitable can give by way of

PSYCHOLOGY'S FAILURE --

RIOTS IN PRISONS in Canada and the United States suggest that modern psychology, as applied to criminals, is not a pronounced For years there has been a growing tendency to handle criminals as if they were mentally ill persons needing to be cured, rather and restraint. Some convicts do reform after serving time; but it may be questioned whether the relatively easy life of the modern jail or

penitentiary accounts for a higher percentage of

reforms than the abhorred methods of the old As far as one can learn without first-hand experience, lite in the modern Canadian prison provides more in the way of welfare-state benefits than are available to the average citizen outside. For example, food and clothing are free; some free amusement is provided. Earnings are low, by union scales, but are not subject

o deductions for income tax, unemployment insurance or old-age pensions. Yet riots occur, either from boredom with much social security, or as a result of the lax discipline advised by modern psychologists. On the theory that the psychology may have been wrong, authorities of the prison farm at Guelph, Ont., where one of the most destructive of recent riots took place, now appear to be trying a policy of strictness. The prisoners may not like it, but then it is only a theory of psychologists that prisons should be made happy

Strict discipline, justice without molly-coddling, will not harm prisoners who are worth eforming, but may keep them from repeating the offences that brought them to prison in the first place. It is unlikely to do much for the prisoners who are incapable of reform. They will always be society's problem; but the problem of society in connection with them is first a matter of self-protection.


