Waldbrooke Farm Scene Of County Match Next Thursday

WALPOLE TOWNSHIP WILL PLAY HOST TO 24th ANNUAL COUNTY CLASSIC

The farm of Edgar M. Waldbrooke on the 11th concession of the Township of Walpole will be the site of the 24th annual Haldimand County Plowing Match on Thursday, October 23rd. The field is known locally as the "Hewitt" field and is situated on the east of Carnoustie and about 2 1/2 miles Southeast of Hagersville.

The board of directors of which Mr. Waldbrooke is the president, is putting every effort into the organization to make this the biggest match yet and there is already evidence that this will be the case. The field selected is an excellent one and centrally located in an area which has produced many champion plowmen. The prize list includes some four-

teen classes with two of these open to horse plowmen and an even dozen for the tractor enthusiasts. The first class for tractor in 500 lbs. is open class while the second class is for boys under 20 years with walking plows.

The tractor classes cover a wide range of horsepower and one of these is Class 4 open to those who have never won a first prize in this class or competed in open tractor class at this match. There are three tractor classes in 500 lbs. and one for boys under 20 years, another for boys 16 years and under a third for boys 20 years and under using three furrow plows. This latter class is new this year.

There are two utility classes again this year, one for two furrow plows and the other for three furrow equipment. These are always popular classes, particularly for the public to watch. In each case the plowman is not permitted to touch his plow by hand, foot or stake and a time limit is placed on each plowman. This should create a great deal of interest again this year.

There are also two classes for mounted plowmen, one open to the world and the other for residents of Haldimand county who have never won a first or second prize in mounted plow class.

The Esso Champions Special is an event that always attracts a great deal of friendly competition as it qualifies the winner to compete in the Esso Class at the International Plowing Match for the overseas trip that is awarded.

The match will close with a banquet in the evening at the Community Centre at Hagersville commencing at 6:00 o'clock. This is always well attended and the Ladies of the Erie L.O.B.A. are making special arrangements to take care of a larger than usual crowd. The special speaker for this will be J. A. Carroll, Assistant Deputy Minister of Agriculture for Ontario. Mr. Carroll is really no stranger to Haldimand and his remarks on this occasion will be of special interest. The banquet will be open to the public with tickets for sale on this week. The prizes in the various events will be presented at the close of the banquet.
