### THE HOLIDAY TOLL

Ontario recorded 26 of the 70 accidental deaths across Canada in the Labor Day holiday fatalities. Of the provincial deaths, 11 were drownings; nine were traffic fatalities and six were from other causes.

One of these was the crash of a light airplane near Midland, when Donald Pinsky, 21, of Toronto, and Norman Dickson, 17, of Port Credit, were killed.

### Approve Purchase of Park Site; Reeve Hobbs Objects

Despite the opposition of Reeve W. H. Hobbs, of Hagersville, Halimand County Council officially approved the purchase of land for a County Park at the August meeting of the Council.

The land in question is known as the William Hare farm, Rainham Township. It consists of 540 feet lake frontage, 100 feet deep and an additional 1472 acres. The lake frontage is to cost \$100.00 per foot and the other land \$150.00 per acre. Total cost of the land will be approximately \$7,700.00 of which the county will receive grant of at least 25% per cent from the Province. The site is about five miles from Selkirk.

No details were discussed at the County Council meeting as to what improvements the committee had in mind for changing the land into a park. It was in this committee's party, that Reeve Hobbs was in opposition to the move. He felt that the park would cost at least \$25,000 before the County was through with it.

There are presently no trees on the property, according to Reeve Hobbs. The Halimand committee will require full before it will be any use. In addition a clear title to the property cannot be secured for some years. There won't be one-third of Halimand's population who will have any use of it because it is at least 15 miles away from the west end of the County.

In the meantime the County has some land along the lake to make into a park. When it will be a park is still indefinite and so is the cost.

The Halimand County entry in the C.N.E. stock show at a field of ten. The winner was Peet Counsell, a Holsteiner bull, shown in the individual classes made a very creditable showing.
