U.S. SWINE AND SWINE PRODUCTS PROHIBITED
Ottawa, August 29, 1952 - Effective immediately all import into Canada from the United States of swine uncooked pork, pork products, offal and garbage is prohibited under authority of the Animal Control- ling Diseases Act. This was announced today by Dr. T. Childs, Veterin- ary Director General of the Fed- eral Department of Agriculture.
This action was taken because of the prevalence in the United States of "vesicular exanthema" a highly infectious disease of swine, which if introduced into Canada could cause serious damage to the Canadian swine industry.
Vesicular exanthema resembles foot and mouth disease, but it is en- tirely confined to swine, whereas foot and mouth disease affects cat- tle and sheep in addition to swine.

ANTHRAX IN P.E.I.
Canada has had a tough time this year with livestock diseases. First it was foot-and-mouth disease in Saskatchewan which resulted in loss of \$10 million to the province and a Canada cattlemen.
Now the agriculture department says a mysterious disease that ap- peared in Prince Edward Island re- sulted in anthrax, terror of the ani- mal world until Louis Pasteur in- vented a successful vaccine 71 years ago.
