Fire Destroys Large Shed, Implements

A large implement shed, with a workshop on the upper floor, was completely destroyed by fire on the farm of Wray Craddock late last night. In addition to the building his complete line of farm implements and power tools were also destroyed. Mr. Craddock managed to get his car and a heavy tractor out and was hurried about his hands. The front tire on the tractor was almost completely burned off when he managed to hook on to it with his truck and draw it out.

The origin of the fire is a mystery. It was an excellent building and kept in perfect order, according to a neighbour. It was large enough to house a complete line of farm implements, much of it new.
