**Statistics Make Reading?**

Statistics make reading a little more interesting. Have you read every word while in the daily paper at the sports page? Last night let us compare a number of statistics and how they affect the national income.

The financial page of The Toronto Star of November 20th has some interesting statistics on the sub-bondings.

Carry of eggs drop sharply - The poultry level higher than last year.

The B.S. mark up on anti-freeze is 19 wire firms "mopped up" since 1948 to 1952.

Canadian Bank net up 20 per cent last year.

The weather forecaster says, "The general picture, now for the week, is that the weather will be mostly clear and dry. Those two from the weather bureau need no elaborate clarification to local readers.

Canadian weekly salaries last week averaged \$7.65, up \$1.11 over the same week last year.

The story was a Canadian Bank Report on the Skinner family.

When a range of 1953 distribution of glycol is reported, it shows an average price in all cases of 27 1/2 cents.

The federal government took 27 1/2 cents in sales tax when canner, wholesaler and retailer.

"Wire Firm" - Virtually the entire electrical equipment industry was accused by Carl Goldenberg, a representative of the industry, of operating a combine in a period of some 41 months.

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### THE OPENING OF SANTA CLAUD VILLAGE

Except for Santa Claus himself, the photographer was about the busiest person around at the recent opening of Santa Claus Village at Val David in the Laurentian Mountains north of Montreal. Filled with the joyous spirit of Christmas, the enthusiastic cameraman recorded the following scenes showing (1) Santa Claus arriving at his new home via a modern helicopter rather than the proverbial reindeer; (2) nine-year-old Marcel Thoinin, a young visitor from Montreal's Mayor Camille Houde, presenting the keys of the new Village to Mayor Beaulieu of Val David; (3) Santa Claus and some of his little helpers being welcomed to his new home; (4) a llama from the slopes of the Peruvian Andes, one of the many animals which roam freely through the Village; (5) Santa Claus' own enthralling one of his many friends; (7) two of the bear cubs reeling in their special-built pit which, when illuminated at night, resembles a giant birthday cake; and (8) the Chapel of Saint Nicholas which contains a crib reminiscent of the first Christmas.

### URGENT CHECK ON SPEEDING; PROTECTION AT SCHOOL CROSSING

A delegation from the Jarvis Board of Trade, headed by Fred Fisher, urged the Village Council on Tuesday night, to take some effective steps to curtail speeding within the Village limits, and to provide some further protection for school children at the street crossing adjacent to the school.

The delegation was named at a meeting of the Board of Trade on Tuesday night. It was pointed out at that time that many vehicles pass through the Village at speeds that can only be regarded as dangerous to the public and that something must be done to prevent the almost certain possibility of a fatality at some future date.

The Council was sympathetic to the views expressed by the delegation and pointed out some of the difficulties involved in providing a constant speed limit. The installation of a speed device was discussed and it was pointed out that this method had been used in Hagersville.

The Board of Trade has undertaken to carry out the work of erecting the trees and lights and have indicated that many merchants will co-operate in the plan for Christmas lighting by adding coloured lighting to the store fronts.

**FAIL TO SECURE FULL COUNCIL IN HAGERSVILLE**

William Hobbs was returned as Reeve of Hagersville for 1954, following the recent nominations. But a second nomination meeting was made necessary when only two nominees for the year council seats qualified for office at 8 o'clock on Monday night. They are Lloyd Symington and W. J. McCarthy. This is the second year in succession that a second nomination meeting has been called in Hagersville.

This month another \$20,000 is being subscribed. By year's end or shortly after the building will be ready for official opening, the whole project free of debt.

A local contractor gets day wages for supervising the work. All other labor is donated. Construction started in early September. On week ends there have been more than 200 working simultaneously and even on week days there are always from 25 to 30.

### Manitoba Village Sets Fine Example

If things are tough out on the western plains because wheat cannot be sold there are no visible signs of it in the French speaking community of St. Pierre, 40 miles south of Winnipeg.

This year the people of the Village, population about 600, and the surrounding parish have undertaken construction of a \$100,000 Community Recreational Center. It includes a skating rink with standard size ice sheet, a waiting room 104 ft. by 39 ft., a public auditorium 104 by 40, and an adjoining three-sheet curling rink.

Cost of the building is about \$60,000 for materials and \$50,000 for labor. In late September promoters undertook to raise the first instalment \$20,000 to pay part of the material. It was subscribed within a week, each of the 120, from 120 different homes in the Village and neighboring farmers within an area of six square miles.
