NEW OIL RECOVERY PLAN?



A \$150,000 lubricating oil reclamation plant, the first of its kind in Canada to operate on a full scale, is being used by the Canadian Pacific Railway to restore used crankcase oil, renewing its "brand new" qualities for the railway's growing fleet of diesel locomotives. The plant, located at the railway's St. Lawrence Montreal, now turns out a daily batch of 375 gallons of re-refined oil and over 5000 lbs. of sludge. The sludge is sent to the complicated re-refining equipment (see left) right) F. A. Berger, chief of motive power and rolling stock of the plant, says: "A. B. Cockshott, chemical engineer in charge of the plant operator George Sinclair, N. R. Crump, vice-president of the C.P.R. and J. W. Legislation to Get Rid of Dairy Surpluses Urged by Federation of Agriculture

Legislation to permit united action by dairy producers to rid the industry of embarrassing surpluses was urged by a delegation from the Ontario Federation of Agriculture appearing before the Executive Council today.

The group, which presented the annual Federation brief to the government, urged amendment of the Milk Control Act to permit:

1. Formation of an administrative producer group to sell and direct the flow of milk to the market.
2. Collection from producers for a fund to stabilize the dairy industry.
3. All divisions of the dairy industry to be administered under one act, instead of under five acts as at present.

An official of the dairy industry said it is hoped to set up a provincial board of producers from the four dairy groups - fluid milk, concentrated milk, cream and cheese - to present holders of P.C.V. licenses, are doing so in order to circumvent the direction of hogs' the brief stated. Support of Ontario hog raisers to remove the surplus through export sale.

A stabilization fund would be used to subsidize sales of surplus dairy products in the export market. The Ontario Cheese Producers Association, United Livestock Sales Ltd., is set up under the hog producers marketing board sell all Ontario produced hogs. It has been in operation since January, 1933.

The government was asked to assist in finding additional markets for hogs. The Federation requested the provincial government, in co-operation with the federal government, where indicated, to secure legislation providing marketing schemes for hogs. The government is to set prices and conditions of sales.

Early implementation of the peach marketing scheme was urged in the brief. Under the scheme, growers would take over marketing of their product.

Turning to rural assessment, the brief recommended appointment of a county assessor for each county; hiring of all township assessors by the county assessor; replacement of township assessor by county assessor; revision by county assessor; and a uniform assessor's manual for use throughout the province.

The brief also recommended:

- (1) Appointment of a provincial director of assessors.
- (2) Educational efforts to show the public the merits of uniform assessment procedure as well as the province and the federal government the brief suggested, and that in building new schools, these facilities essential to education should be provided.

In the opinion of the Federation, a department to give further attention and advice on the sound development of farm co-operatives in the province should be set up under the department of agriculture markets branch, the brief stated.

"We are passing through a period of transition in this country. Our agricultural population in this province is declining as large-scale farming becomes industrialized," the brief said. "This seems to point up the necessity for a more broad-based agricultural policy and the development of intelligent, well-directed production programs to feed the increasing population, coupled with an adequate marketing program which will make it sufficiently profitable to produce the right kinds of quality products."

"We believe provincial and federal governments and the agricultural industry should accept responsibility in the study of future food requirements and use of land now and in the future, so that some direction can be given in the development of sound production policies for agriculture."
