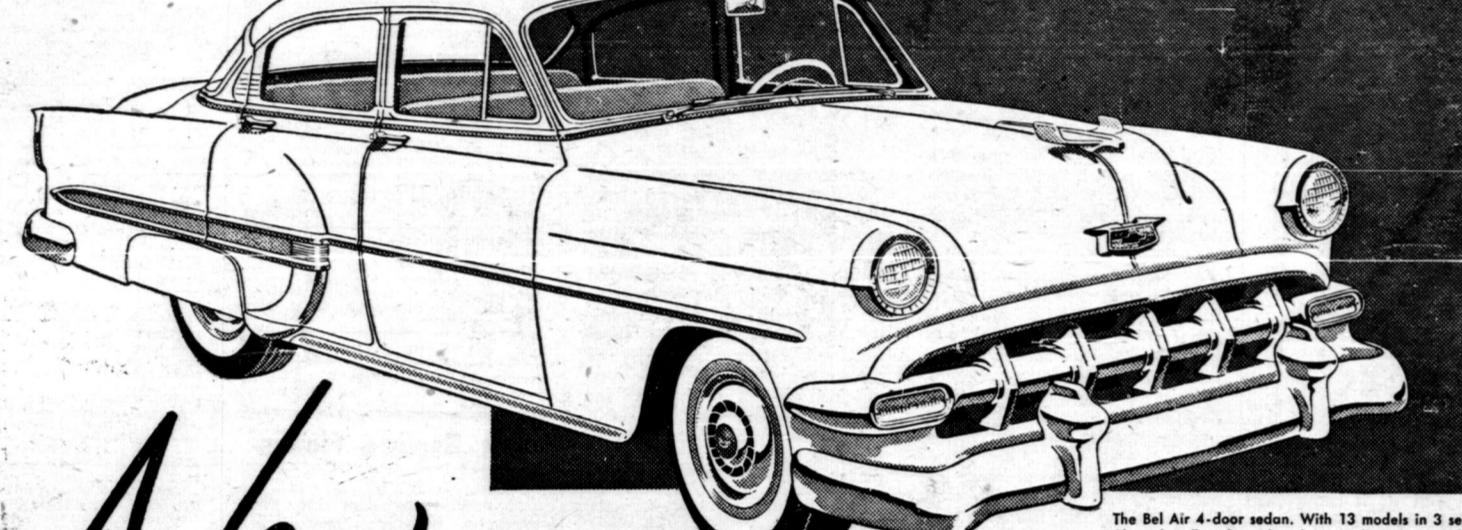
RENTON
