Worthy of note is the fact that while General Motors had fewer workers in 1952 than in 1951, its wage bill was up from \$1,688 million to \$2,020 million. This indicated high wages may lead to unemployment. The question is how many of our industries may soon have to face it whether it is better to have 100 men working at \$80.00 a week or 80 men working for \$100.00 a week, with the remaining 20 unemployed. Unions prefer the latter, but unemployed workers have different views on the subject.

What inflation will do is cited by the National City Bank of New York. Take for example a \$75.00 war bond purchased in 1942 with a maturity value of \$100.00 in 1952. For an individual having other income sufficient only to place him in the initial income tax bracket, the income tax on the accumulated \$25.00 interest came to \$3.55, leaving net proceeds of \$96.45. But when account is taken of the 62% increase in prices as measured by the official cost-of-living index between 1942 and 1952 the holder finds that an inflation tax of \$38.43 has been levied against him. Thus the result of the transaction is that for the \$75.00 he gave up in 1942, he gets back in 1952 even less in real buying power than he started with. The same thing applies to Canadians.

weed is a different plant and requires different control. St. John's Wort is now in flower in most parts of the county and it is resistant to 2,4-D. It can be so treated as a broadleaf. Chlorate mixtures be used on small patches. Good cultivation in areas that can be so treated is probably the most effective method of control.

A new Hydrologic Station has been established at the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph to make a study of the soil through a runoff. During the period May 1 to 20 a total of 6.13 inches of rainfall was recorded. These rains, however, were not in the shape of rain but in the shape of a steady drizzle. The amount of water that fell was 1.04 inches. This was under a system of continuous and the runoff was just under a ton of soil per acre whereas an out-bay strip-cropping system made for a loss of just over two tons of top soil per acre. These are very interesting figures and it would pay a farmer to visit the station and see the plot the next time you happen to make a trip to the college.

"Banquets for Bugs" in the United States are said to cost the farmer in the neighbourhood of \$4 billion per year. That is a conservative estimate of the bug damage across the line. No doubt the damage to farmers' crops in Canada will cost a proportionate amount. Someone with an analytical mind has figured out that at the above rate the bugs will have eaten farm crops totalling \$200,000 during the time that it takes to read this one line. In any case it is costing money to permit the bugs to continue to eat our crops either our live stock and in general to make a nuisance of themselves.

Have you been checking your fields for new weeds lately? This is the season of the year when they can be seen most easily. If the infestation is small it would be good business to get rid of them by hand pulling. If this is not practical then the use of chemicals may be followed. In any case get the weed identified so you will know how serious it is and how hard it will be to control. It is unfortunate that the outbreak of leafy spurge that was discovered last week in the seedling stage has now been hand pulled.

Chickory is coming into full bloom in many fields these days. Please note that chickory is sometimes erroneously called "Blueweed." Blue
