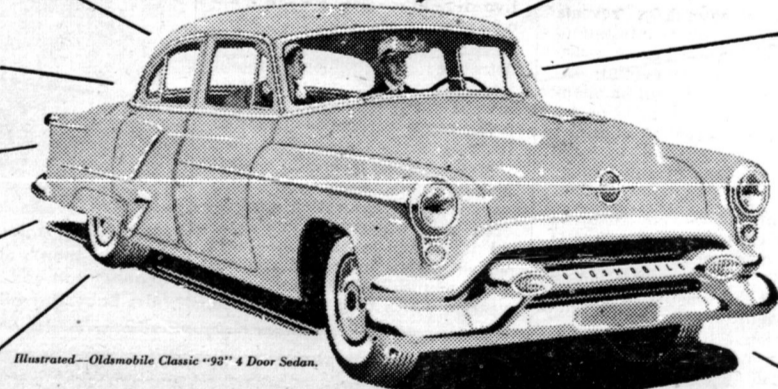

Dr. JOHN A. CHARLTON ADDRESSES GROUP OF AMERICAN V.M.A.

Dr. John A. Charlton, Paris, was privileged to give the official "Welcome" address to some 2,000 members who formed a record attendance at the 90th Annual Convention of the American Veterinary Medical Association. Seven different countries were represented at the convention held at the Royal York Hotel, Toronto, on July 20, 21 and 22, in conjunction with the 5th Annual Convention of the Canadian Veterinary Medical Association of which Dr. Charlton is the retiring President.

In welcoming the guests from the different countries, Dr. Charlton dwelt on Canada's growth and gave a brief resume of the various highlights of the provinces.

GREAT HONOUR FOR CANADA
"This is Canada's century in both economic and cultural activities," he said. "And nothing in world history can equal its possibilities."

Dr. Charlton stated that it was a great honour for Canada and the City of Toronto to act as hosts to the convention. "We only regret that our Prime Minister, Mr. St. Laurent, and the Mayor of the City of Toronto, Mr. Lampert, could not see their way clear to be with us."

In conclusion, Dr. Charlton mentioned that Canada was richly endowed by nature and was indeed a "Really pleasant" vacation land. "You must see Canada," he concluded, "and we bid you welcome."

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS
In his "President's Address" to the Canadian Veterinary Medical Association, Dr. Charlton mentioned that last year when he was elected President, he was given sound advice by the retiring President, Dr. Savage, "to keep myself as Dr. Charlton, President of the Association, divorced from the industry," Mr. Charlton, Member of Parliament.

"Anything, however, which I have been able to do as a member of parliament for our organization, I have done for the profession, to which I belong. I have never been able to work miracles, but I have done my best," he told members.

BROUGHT MANY REWARDS
Dwelling on the past year, Dr. Charlton stated that it had brought many rewards. In highlighting some of the events he mentioned his attendance at annual meetings in Ontario, Ottawa, Alberta, Edmonton and the Maritimes, as well as the special meetings held in British Columbia, Saskatchewan and Manitoba. Dr. Charlton paid tribute to the support accorded him by members of the board and expressed the hope they would give the incoming President, Dr. J. Dufraine, St. Hyacinthe, Quebec, the same consideration.

Other officers elected were: Dr. R. M. Archibald, Truro, N.S., Vice President and Dr. Orin Hall, Ottawa, re-elected Secretary Treasurer.
