West Haldimand Branches Review Successful Year

Monday, June 15th — Mrs. Lewis, Caledonia, presided at the annual meeting of the West Haldimand Branch of the Canadian Pacific Railway, held at the Rural Youth Centre, with more than 100 delegates registered for the day and afternoon sessions. The Rev. T. E. Dahme, of Hagersville, conducted the opening exercises, emphasizing the importance of the railway in the lives of the people of the district. A good example, "Character is what you are not taught," he said.

EXCELLENT REPORTS
Miss Gladys Dennis Holmes, Branch Secretary, gave the address of welcome. Mrs. E. E. Smith, of Hagersville, reported total receipts in the district of \$768.15, and in the branch \$45.78.

Excellent reports from standing committees were given, showing an increase in activity along all lines of work. One of the outstanding events of the year was the celebration of the 50th Anniversary of the district at Selkirk.

Mr. Robert Paisley, Dunville, stated board member, reported various activities and projects of the district. He also gave information on the plans for the coming year. The annual conference of the A.C.W.W. was held on Friday, August 21. Some 200 delegates were present. A large number of delegates were from the West Haldimand Branch. The conference was held at the Hotel Victoria, Selkirk, Manitoba.

There have been many changes on the Rural Route Three, which includes the Fourth and Fifth Concessions of Walpole Township, since Jack Nicol started to draw mail. For example there were no stone roads forty years ago, nor were there any mechanical horses — at least none a mail carrier could depend on. A light team was standard equipment in those days and it was not until 1922 that Jack Nicol purchased his first car, a model "T" Ford. He has been driving Ford ever since with the exception of one time when he tried a Gray Dorr.

Jack has about 86 stops on his route and there has been little change in that number since he started. There are not many of the original horse holders left in 1953. These include John Jacques, Emerson Miller (Alex. Saunders' Frank Pond, Gordon Schwyer and J. W. McBurney.

Unless the weather has been impossible, Jack has made his daily trip over Route Three without fail all these years. The worst interruption in service which he can remember came back a few years ago when snow blocked the roads in some parts of the Route for a ten week period. During that time he managed to keep his patrons satisfied by watching for them in town and getting their mail in hand before they could get out of town.

Jack Nicol was born in Mosyanine, Poland, and came to Canada in 1905. He assisted in farm work until 1914 when he took over the mail route. He continued to assist in farm work for a few years after that, but in recent years he has confined his activities to drawing mail. Jack says he thinks he will be on the mail route for the rest of his life. There is no one who knows the Fourth and Fifth Concessions of Walpole better than Jack Nicol.

Starting Fortieth Year As Mail Courier On Route No. 3

The month of June, back to the year 1914, Jack Nicol started to draw mail on Rural Route Number three out of Jarvis, and he has performed that service continuously ever since. He has been drawing his Fortieth year on the job. There are very few mail carriers in the Province of Ontario with such a record.
