Several groups formed up at the Jarvis Public School and marched to the arena. The parade route was along Monson Street to Main, then south to the intersection of N. Main and No. 3 Highways, then easterly to the park street and to the arena. The groups making up the parade included the Veterans, Boy Scouts, Cubs, C.G.I.T. and Rooms One, Two and Three of the Jarvis Public School. These units were awarded prizes by the Board of Trade as follows: First, Room One Public School; Second, C.G.I.T.; Third, Boy Scouts; Fourth, Cubs. Nancy Miller was awarded a prize as the best dressed individual in the parade.

A ceremony at the arena was conducted by Rev. W. H. Putter. Miss Meta MacCarthy presided at the piano for the singing of patriotic songs. Others taking part in the service were Mrs. Laurel Brown, Reeve George W. Walker, Rev. Kenneth Richardson and Rev. Arthur Packman. Rev. Mr. Packman announced the prize winners in the parade and they were presented by James Andrews, Secretary of the Board of Trade.

Criticism Of Amateur Show Victoria Day Gets Response

Lamb's School took home most of the prize money as it was, and many other thoughts that come to mind. However, that would serve no useful purpose. I sincerely hope that this will put an end to the matter as I feel that any further argument would only make matters worse. I cannot help but think that Mrs. Hodges should have voiced her complaints before the Club and not before the public. She does however, live in Hedges that it does a good service to this community and I want to give its good name in the minds of any of your readers who may have taken the remarks made last week seriously. I hesitate to add that these thoughts are my own and do not necessarily reflect what or who the Lions themselves may think.

Mrs. Hodges asks, "But does it not matter in what way they get their money to give this service? also in what way they spend it? Let some of the Amateur Show was never as a matter of fact, there is little doubt that they would have taken in as much or very close to it if the Amateur Show was staged since there was no admission charge to the show itself, or no entry fee. Most of the people who came to the show would have been there anyway.

Mrs. Hodges goes on to suggest that Lamb's School is undesirable to this show. I believe they are to be given great credit for the work they did in repeating their Christmas Concert for a larger audience. I have much respect for the teachers and pupils of Lamb's School who are to be congratulated for presenting many fine numbers. However, make no mistake about it, there is no such thing as an indispensable person or group. Take Lamb's School out and the show perhaps would not have been as good, but it definitely would have gone on.

As to the point in Mrs. Hodges' letter which frankly annoys me, she states that she is not prejudiced because her children's letter took part and then later she intimates very strongly that a teacher who definitely is prejudiced in favour of the children she teaches. I wonder if she has yet made up her mind as to whether she is a biased or not. As a parent, I accept the teacher's judgement following the example of the two teachers previous to me who also accepted the prize money when a GROUP from their school won a prize. I had taught and trained these girls. What other teacher should accept the prize? Did you ever hand three dollars to eight little girls and say "Here — divide it among you?"

If it was mentioned before the show committee that Lamb's School would not get all the prizes, this year? I assure you that it never had during the judging did we compare our cards. Each of the three judges was handed a card upon which were listed the names of the various classes. Each contestant was judged upon six qualifications depending upon the type of entry. A maximum number of points was allowed for each qualification. The judges did not total the number of points given to each contestant. At the end of each class the scores were handed to the Amateur Show Committee, who first of all tallied the number of points on the separate cards for each individual. Then the three totals were added together. Thus you can see that the judges were not in anyway dependent upon each other's opinions. The judges did not know themselves who the winners were until it was announced.

I would also like to point out that being the teacher of one group that competed did not influence my decision. Having been the one who trained them, their mistakes were obvious to me, when others never even noticed them. Please believe me when I tell you that I judged them as fairly as I did the other entries.

Now I would like to come to the real reason for writing this letter. Not only as a judge but as a spectator and a teacher I would like to offer my constructive criticisms of the Amateur Show. I feel that nothing is ever so good that it can't be improved upon.

First, I would like to suggest that in a manner which the judging as done should be explained to the audience previous to the performance. Second — the entries from an amateur school should be limited, thus encouraging the participation of more schools.

Yes, Jarvis Lions Club go ahead and have another Amateur Show next year and I know it will be as good as the one this year.
