Federation Facts

The County Federation Directors met at a joint meeting with the Cream Producers' Association on Wednesday, October 26th at Kohler. Mr. R. H. Jardine, secretary manager of the Ontario Cream Producers' Marketing Board was in attendance.

Mr. Jardine explained how his organization acting as a pressure group and accomplished a good deal in favor of the farmer. He stated: "legislation regulates group bargaining, establishes prices, and prevents price cutting." "In future," he continued, "we hope to continue legislation, improve marketing conditions and control the use of edible oils in dairy products." In the advertisement, Mr. Jardine told of how finances will not allow bringing all dairy products to the farm at one time. Therefore a monthly promotion of one product has been adopted; e.g. September, the advertising of milk. October cheese, and November butter.

There is seemingly no possibility of banning margarine, however it is illegal to colour it at the present time. The same meeting at the Royal York Hotel on November 17th will deal with problems arising from the fall meetings held in each county in Ontario.

The Haldimand County Hog Producers' Association held a meeting here in the Federation Office on Friday, October 30th. The main part of the discussion centered around the merits of the Ontario Hog Producers' Marketing Scheme. Wilbert Kountze pointed out that back a few months when cholera broke out stopping export of hogs, that had it not been for this Marketing Scheme persuading the farmers to hold their hogs till the price was settled, it would have gone down instead of up. To Mr. Kountze this meant the difference of five dollars for every 200 pound hog.

It has been suggested that the galsign project be continued, with a little missionary work being done outside of the Farm Forum.

The Township Federation meetings will have to be over before the end of November. I would like it to take place in your Township on November 22nd which is a scheduled Farm Forum round up night. It would be a combined meeting of Farm Forum and Township Federation members for the purpose of appointing your new officers and directors for 1956.

FIRST IN HALDIMAND GROUND IMPROVEMENT

GORE SCHOOL, IN ONKIDA TOWNSHIP PLACES SECOND

The Executive of the Caledonia Fair Society has announced the winners of the Haldimand School Ground Improvement Contest. Prizes amounting to \$550 were donated at the Fair Grounds on Friday afternoon. Mr. David Dick presented the prizes. A complete list of the winners is as follows:

No. 5 South Cayuga (Wismer's Corners) First Prize \$200; No. 7 Gore (Gore School) Second Prize \$100; No. 9 North Cayuga (Glasby School) Third Prize \$100; No. 9 North Walpole (Fourth Prize \$100); No. 1 South Walpole (Nanticoke) Fifth Prize \$50.

Mr. T. Woolley, President of the Caledonia Fair Society introduced the School Inspector for Haldimand County, Mr. Donald Young. Mr. Young mentioned that No. 5 South Cayuga had placed First in all of the Fair Grounds on Friday afternoon. Mr. David Dick presented the prizes. A complete list of the winners is as follows:

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Hog marketings from Haldimand were down again for the month of August. As a matter of fact they were down by almost one-third. During the past month 1,064 hogs were sold through inspected plants as compared with 1,557 during the same month of last year. During August 1953 there were 549 hogs or 32.80 per cent in the top grade where as a year ago this figure was 421 or 29.60 per cent. The bulk of the out-looked hogs were in the B1 grade and great many of these could have been in the top grade had they been marketed at the proper weights.

In travelling around Haldimand county during the past week many sentiments that we require a greater manure piles have been seen that should have been moved out on the farms. Farmyard manure, one of the most valuable products of the farm will not do any one any good if it is not properly handled. Are you wintering over any dry place where it can be useful in the place where it has no source of organic matter that has been raised out of this type should receive an

quite as high. In Haldimand County organic matter is one of the essential nutrients that we require to a greater degree than many others. Let us get about 20 pounds of hay per day. It is better if at least one-third or around 8 pounds is good quality legume hay if no protein is being fed. Most farmers will have an ample supply of hay this year but if it happens to be scarce straw can be used providing one pound of protein is fed daily. Usually it will take a little less than two tons of hay to carry a cow through the winter.
