SOIL SENSE

After an interruption of many months, this column is again being written for Haldimand County farmers. While the title remains the same, the writers have changed. My predecessor's choice of the column heading "Soil Sense" was well made, and so it will remain.

It is my hope and the hope of the Haldimand Soil Committee, that the reader will find this column interesting and informative. We hope that this particular phase of our work will benefit all those who read it, so let's get started.

Organic matter is an excellent item to start with, especially when discussing clay soils. The essential difference between a rich and productive soil, and a dead soil, is the organic matter content of the soil. In a representative mineral soil the amount of organic matter present is small (approximately 3 or 4 per cent) in comparison with the mineral materials of that soil. However, the importance of that small amount of organic matter cannot be stressed too much.

Much has been written about these new chemical soil conditioners, their effect on difficult soils, and their cost. In most cases the claims made are true. But nature has her own soil conditioners, the organic matter - which is just as effective as the chemical types, and may be had for a fraction of the cost. The effect that organic matter has on the physical condition of the soil is of utmost importance to Haldimand farmers. It has been estimated that from 7 to 12 times more power is required to plough a clay soil that is very low in organic matter as compared with one that has a high organic matter content. The economic value of organic matter may be seen at once from this single fact.

The presence of organic matter in the soil is important for many other reasons as well, although they are not so evident to the eye. In a fertile soil there are millions of bacteria and fungi. These micro-organisms obtain their food and energy from the organic matter in the soil, and either multiply or decrease in number in direct proportion to the amount of organic matter present. The more soil organic matter present, the more soil organic matter we can add to our soil, the larger the micro-organism population will be, and the greater the biochemical activity. This chain reaction is vital to the most efficient use of fertilizers and the very life of the soil.

Besides improving the structure of the soil through granulation and adding to the life of the soil, organic matter plays a very important role in the soil conservation program of any farm, county, or province. Erosion on Haldimand soils is more serious than many of us realize. While gullying is evident only in extreme cases, there is another type of erosion, a more insidious type, that is, taking a far greater toll on our fertility resources. It is called sheet erosion. The evidence is in the fence rows, in the islands of silt in those rivers, and in the gradual lowering of fertility levels in many areas. One organic matter level in the soil to the optimum. This would give the soil a crumb-like structure pervious to water, yet not easily separated into fine particles by the forces of rain and surface water, to be carried away forever.

Nothing has been said about ways and means of incorporating organic matter into the soil. This information may be obtained from several sources and will be discussed in future releases in this column.

Another type of activity which can be obtained is that of medical services, and credit unions both of which are of advantage to the farmer. Problems which are not receiving enough attention by the Township Council can be stressed by the Township Federation for action; such as faulty bridges, highway and hydro right of way allowances to farmers.
