

PINWHEEL LOAF pastry flour (or 2½ c. once-sifted hard-wheat flour), 5½ tsps. Magic Baking Powder, ¾ tsp. salt. Cut in finely 7 tbs. chilled shortening. Combine ½ c. milk and ½ tsp. vanilla. Make a well in dry ingredients and add liquids; mix lightly with a fork. Knead for 10 seconds on lightly-floured board and roll out to ½" thick rectangle, board and roll out to ½" thick rectangle, 8½" along one side. Cream together 1 tbs. butter or margarine, ½ c. peanut butter and ½ c. lightly-packed brown sugar; sprinkie on rolled-out dough.
