All boys within the age limit stated above are eligible and are urged to be present at this meeting.

It is understood the league games will be played under lights at Fisherville, Selkirk and Jarvis, providing the present tentative plans develop.

On the Farm Front

BRIEF NOTES FOR THE BUSY FARMER

By Haldimand Harry

During the month of March Haldimand Hog Producers marketed a total of 1855 hogs of which 453 or 24.6 per cent were in the top grade. A year ago this figure was 2621 hogs with 903 or 34.5 per cent in the top grade. This is not a very good showing as far as quality is concerned. As per usual there were too many "C" grade and far too many "Heavies" and "Extra Heavies".

In this connection the estimates for marketings for the period of July, August and September of this year have just come forward and it is expected there will be an increase of 15.2 per cent in the number of hogs from the West and 7.9 per cent from the East.

The Ontario Hog Producers Association is expected to be around 6.0 per cent over the same period of last year. The estimate for Haldimand is much lower, being 6.6 per cent.

The address and proceedings of the annual meeting of the Ontario Soil and Crop Improvement Association has now been issued and it makes a wonderful book for the farmer to have as a reference. It contains a lot of valuable information on soil and crop problems and is free for the asking. Be sure to pick up a copy the next time you happen to be calling at your agricultural representative's office or drop a request in the mail and it will be sent to you.

Butter production in Haldimand seems to be still on the decline although the drop from February 1953 to February 1954 is less than seven thousand pounds. For that month this year the figure is 150,723 pounds as compared with 159,093 pounds a year ago.

The provincial figure is also down by 2.7 per cent. For the two months, January and February, the total production in Haldimand was 342,045 pounds as compared with 402,075 pounds a year ago.

The work with soybeans in the Haldimand county in the hope that a variety that will be completely suitable for our soil and climatic conditions will eventually be found. Most farmers who grow them this year were well pleased with the crop and as we become more familiar with the methods that have to be followed in growing soybeans we will increase our efficiency. With the late spring it just might be another good year for them. There seems to be a ready market for any surplus you may have and they are a good crop to grow from the standpoint of the soil itself.

Milk producers should be very careful when turning their cows out on pasture. First there is the possibility of blood, particularly if the pastures are mainly legume and luxuriant in growth but there is also the fact that any pasture is likely to have an effect on the milk going. With the heavy surplus going to market the processors are sure to turn back a considerable quantity because of an off-flavour. Grading for short periods at the beginning and making sure that the cows have had a full feed or dry hay before going out will assist greatly in the prevention of blood. Taking the cows from pasture, particularly alfalfa and similar legumes a couple of hours before milking and making sure that they do not have an opportunity of grazing on bad flavoured weeds such as wild onions, wild garlic and the like will do much to prevent bad flavoured milk from going to the market.

Be sure to inoculate any legume seed that you may be sowing this year. That is good advice any time but it is a bit of advice that many farmers do not seem to heed. The seed is so low that probably farmers do not think it can be insured. Really it is a cheap insurance. Naturally, the inoculation of the seed will not take the place of other good practices.
