The fall meeting was invited to the morning session, Church Women, W.A. and W.M.S. at the home of Mrs. Barlow on April 29th with a good attendance.

HALDIMAND HISTORICAL SOCIETY MEETING

The April meeting of the Halldmand Historical Society was held in the Court House, Cayuga, on Monday evening with a good attendance. The Rev. Percy Mayes in the chair. The Secretary, Mrs. Edgar Jones, presented the minutes and responded. Mrs. Wm. Mitchell, of Hagersville, welcomed an invitation to the Society to be the guests of Hagersville Women's Institute in the United Church on the evening of the Second Monday in May. The invitation was accepted. The Society decided to pay one half the price of a highway sign signifying the location of the County Buildings and Museum. Mrs. Leonard Badgley of Toronto, spoke briefly and presented the Society with a scrapbook he had made when a boy in Candfield Village. Mrs. R. A. Miller dealt with the life of Col. John Norton, a colourful figure on the Grand River about the time of the War of 1812 to '14, marrying into the Mohawk tribe. He is credited with being next to Chief Joseph Brant in importance among the Six Nations Indians of his day. Mrs. Paul Christensen of Cayuga, and a native of Denmark, described her plane trip to her native land last November. Spending a month in and about Copenhagen, she compared conditions there as she found them, against the way she had remembered them, declaring herself glad to be a Canadian and explaining some souvenirs she had brought back with her. Mrs. Barlow, assisted by Nancy and Leonard, served a dainty lunch. The hostess was Mrs. A. E. Doughty.
