be taken to have this legislation changed).

Councillor Featherstone said, "For us to buy the proper equipment, to hire crews - and to keep them on the road on a 24-hour basis - the cost would be up in the thousands and thousands of dollars."

The road committee, Mr. Arrell and Councillor K. Bain Munro (Cayuga Reeve) will study specific jurisdiction on the matter and report to Council at its next meeting, when a resolution will probably be made.

Councillor Featherstone also reported that Approaches to the Brockton Creek Bridge had been completed.

County Road No. 16 now has a stone base, and the County fence program had been started.

In making the finance committee's report, Councillor Charles Lamb (Dunville Reeve) suggested to Council that surrounding counties be contacted regarding the amount each paid for the counties and also regarding methods of marking.
