On The Farm Front

BRIEF NOTES FOR THE BUSY FARMER

At the "Crops" meetings last week Prof. Chapman of Wisconsin quoted a French axiom as follows: "Our Soil is Our Country. To Save the One is to Save the Other." That is something we all should keep in mind. It is important that we give careful consideration to ways and means of conserving our soil resources and of bringing them up to somewhere near normal again. This requires the careful studying of the soil problem, learning its needs and then promptly doing something about building it up.

The use of a fine firm seed bed for small seeds cannot be too strongly emphasized. This was stressed by Mr. Geo. McLoughlin also at the "Crops" meetings. This with the shallow seeding method has made it possible for him to reduce the quantity to sow per acre down to 12 lbs. recommended ordinarily. Mr. McLoughlin maintained that he has never had any better catches than during the past few years.

Annual meetings are still in the air and the Ontario annuals are now

being held. The Ontario Plowmen's Association Annual will be held on February 22nd and 23rd, and the Plowmen's Convention will be following immediately on February 24th, 25th and 26th with the Class B section on the 24th and the regular convention on the 25th and 26th. Live stock animals are also being held during the next couple of weeks and reference to any of the Farm Journals will give a complete list.

Have you gotten rid of that boarder cow yet? If not do not delay longer. She is costing you money and this is not the time to have to say for the fun of just keeping her around. If you are waiting for the market for that class of cattle to improve you may have to wait a long time and anyway you are likely to lose more in keeping her around than you will make in any improvement in the cattle market. Get rid of her now.

If you are operating a tractor you will be interested in a series of new circulars now available and dealing with Carburetors, Ignition, Lubrication, Valves and Cooling Systems, with a separate circular on each. For instance, if you are having any difficulty with the carburetion then all you would need would be a copy of the circular on this part of the subject. You may get any one of these pamphlets or all five by applying to your Agricultural Representative.

New regulations governing the use of certain insect and rodent control materials have just been announced. These come under the Public Health Act and require that a license be obtained before using any of the chemicals listed in the regulations.
