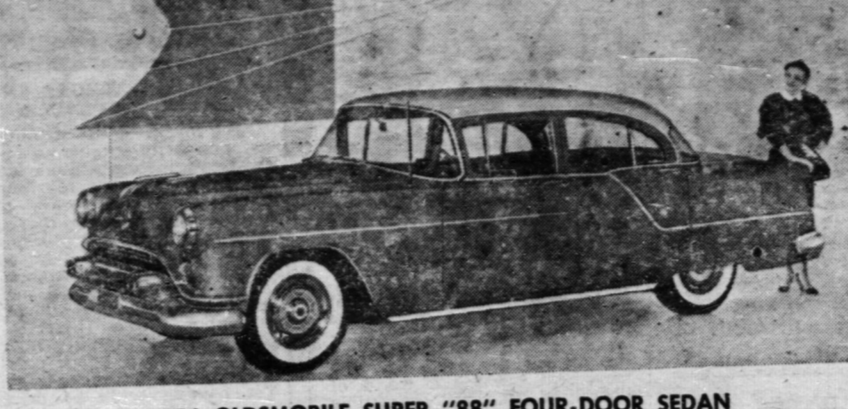

Experiments With Frozen Semen Prove Very Encouraging

The work of the Hamilton District Cattle Breeders Association is attracting growing attention as it is reported that frozen semen has now been advanced to the point where it is being used successfully in the field.

Keith Stalwood, Technician for the Association in this area, reported that he had gathered the first frozen semen from a bull in the development of his herd. The bull was named "Sire" and was taken from the herd on January 15th. The semen was frozen on January 16th and was used on January 17th. The result was a successful pregnancy.

The experiments have been going on for a long time both in Canada and the United States. The O.A.C. is reported to be making it possible for the work to be held indefinitely.
