

Had such facilities been available here it is not unreasonable to sup-pose that at least half of the houses would have been built in The building of thirty-six new houses in Hagers-

ville will bring in at least \$5,000 annually in taxes. The services required by the development will likely be taken care of with existing facilities. Therefore the added revenue can actually be applied against the cost of installing waterworks and sewage originally. What other developments will take place as a result of having waterworks and sewage are impossible to estimate. It is not unreasonable to expect, however, that the entire project will be paid for by new development, and in the meantime all citizens will have the benefit these services provide.
