Community Hall Financial Statement

The financial position of the Jarvis Community Hall Building Fund is set forth in concise form below, as of June 2, 1954. The Hall is now complete, except for some minor improvements outside, such as grading and cleaning up. It will be noted in the report, which has been prepared by the Treasurer, Joseph Reynolds, that the overall cost is very close to the original estimate of \$30,000.

Current liabilities amount to \$3,995.25, less a balance on hand of \$182.44. This leaves an outstanding balance of slightly more than \$3,800.

Cognizance of this balance should be noted by all local organizations and individuals and consideration should be immediately given toward paying off this balance.

It is doubted if many hold to the theory that the operation of the building will yield surpluses that might permit the balance being paid off in this way over a period of time. In fact, we think that the building will justify itself by meeting operating expenses.

The outstanding balance is not large and can easily be met within a short time if everyone will remain mindful of the obligation to return this debt. Local organizations have supported the building commendably thus far and it is reasonable to expect they will all take a part and help in retiring the outstanding obligation.

HISTORY OF S.S. No. 10
To begin with the history of education in this section, it is interesting to note that the first school house was a little log school about a quarter of a mile west of the corner on No. 3 Highway. The next school was built of brick, a little east on the corner of No. 3 Highway and the sidewalk. The bricks have also been used in building Mr. G. McKnight's house. There was no yard and since it was built in an orchard, no land could be bought. It was called Armstrong's School as people by that name lived across the street, and had an ashery where pottery was produced. Nearby was a quarry from which stones were taken for building No. 3 Highway.
