Some crops frequently fail to grow well because the nutrient elements they require from the soil for their existence are "fixed", that is, they are not in a form the plants can take up and absorb and use, according to Prof. T. J. Heeg of the Soils Department, Ontario Agriculture College. This condition can be caused by acid soils and can be corrected by the use of lime in Haldimand County. The one way to overcome this situation is to neutralize the soil by applying lime. Lining a soil increases the fertilizer efficiency of the soil as well as doing a lot of other beneficial jobs such as improving the physical condition of soil, providing calcium for plant growth.

W. P. Watson, Secretary of the Ontario "Lionel Enrolment Board has announced that in Ontario no person shall state, travel or offer for sale or lease any stallion unless that stallion is enrolled. Board of Trade Favors Action on Waterworks and Sewage

(EDITORIAL)

MORE THAN TWENTY YEARS have passed since the citizens of Jarvis were afforded an opportunity to express their views concerning the installation of waterworks. At that time the ratepayers of Jarvis said "No" to a plan to install a waterworks system at a cost between thirty and forty thousand dollars. This unfortunate decision was discussed at a meeting of the Jarvis Board of Trade last Friday night and the comment was made that the system would have now been paid for.

It was the consensus of opinion at the meeting that Jarvis should have a waterworks and sewage disposal system, favored the development of such an undertaking, and every member of the Board of Trade was in agreement.

This expression of opinion would indicate a change of thinking from twenty years ago. At that time there was a unanimity of opinion. It was generally believed that taxes would go up to the point where many people would lose the vote toward progress was turned down.

It is true that the years ago and that need will be accentuated as time goes on. It is also true that the cost today would be substantially higher than it was twenty years ago, but here again, the costs need now for such a system.

It would be interesting to know if the citizens of Jarvis generally share the feelings of the members of the Board of Trade who, without exception, want the earliest possible date.

The columns of this paper are open for discussion of this subject.

V.O.N. Service for Haldimand Discussed by Local Group

Representatives from the Jarvis Group of the Women's Institutes attended a meeting on Friday afternoon, June 18th in the United Church Sunday School at which the meeting was presided over by Mrs. Ross, a representative from the Victorian Order of Nurses. This meeting was held at the request of the Women's Institutes and Federation of Agriculture who are interested in establishing a V.O.N. Service in Haldimand County. Miss Ross, of Haldimand, presided and Mrs. Ross, of Haldimand, acted as secretary.

The V.O.N. is a national organization from coast to coast in Canada with 115 branches and a staff of 500 nurses. The main object is to promote part time home nursing care, which is available to everyone regardless of race, creed or financial resources. The Victorian Order Nurses are also a part of the family physician answers all calls in the home. There is a need and will work under the supervision of the family physician where special treatment is needed.

The first year of organizing a V.O.N. Service in Haldimand County would cost approximately \$8,000, but about \$2,000. Haldimand County would require for efficient service two nurses and two cars with additional staff according to the demand.

The speaker pointed out that V.O.N. nurses receive a salary and all expenses are collected from the patients served by them in turned into the V.O.N. funds. Fees for visits are \$1.50 to \$2.00. No case is refused because of inability to pay and fees paid are confidential between nurse and patient.

In order to establish such a service there must be public interest and a campaign for funds to establish a branch would be necessary. One standard each branch manage their own affairs but accept professional standards and policies of the national organization which is governed by the National Board of Governors with representation from every branch in Canada.

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
