BRIEF NOTES FOR THE BUSY FARMER

A total of forty-six community sales have been licensed for operation in the Province for the current year of 1954. Most of these are located in the southern part of the province - two of them in the County of Haldimand.

Some final figures on the marketing of hogs in Ontario during 1953 have now come forward. Perth County was the heaviest hog producing County in 1953 with over 100,000 hogs being sold. Waterloo was next with 127,000 followed by Wellington with 124,000 and Huron with 122,000. Waterloo has the highest percentage of "A" grade hogs with 21.6 per cent, followed by Bruce (20.8 per cent), Grey (20.2 per cent) and Peterborough (20.2 per cent).

Haldimand had 31.9 per cent grade "A" as was also in this column a week or so ago and was 14th in the Central and Western regions of Ontario and 16th in a provincial sale. Haldimand was actually below Lincoln and Essex in the percentage of top grade hogs. Essex has for years been noted for its heavy hogs.

The annual Bull Sale will be taking place in Toronto on Tuesday and Wednesday, March 23rd and 24th. The Hereford and Aberdeen Angus breeds will be shown and sold on Tuesday and the Short-horns will go on the block on Wednesday. The show commences at 11 A.M. each morning with the sale being called for 11:00 A.M. Every Ontario buyer at this sale will be eligible for a premium equal to one-third of the purchase price but not exceeding \$150.00.

Haldimand and district will be well represented at this sale with ten breeders having cattle listed. Five of these are Hereford breeders, four Angus and one Shorthorn. The catalogue lists Hagan Brothers Jack Riosman, Paul Stoneham, Edward Williams of all Caledonia and F. W. Reiche and Son of Jarvis with Hereford, Angus and one Shorthorn. The Kohler of Cayuga and Gordon Berry and Burton Griffith of Gilmford are also listed under the Ontario section. Anybody can do it - let us help you get started. U.S. Expert Will Judge Bull Show

SEEK CATTLE BREEDERS WILL HAVE OPPORTUNITY TO SELECT SUPERIOR STOCK

W. P. Watson, Ontario Livestock Commissioner, announced today that Robert Walker, of the Great Oaks Stock Farm, Rochester, Michigan, will officiate as judge at the forthcoming Ontario County Fair Sale to be held in the Sheep and Swine barn, Ontario County Fair Building, Toronto, March 8th and 10th.

Some 363 of Ontario's finest beef animals will be shown at the sale providing persons interested in beef cattle with an outstanding opportunity to select their next herd sire from the high quality animals offered.

Altogether some 173 breeders are shipping 363 animals to the sale, including 128 Herefords, 85 Angus, Aberdeen-Angus, and 188 Shorthorn Herefords and Aberdeen-Angus will be shown and sold on Tuesday, March 9th and the Shorthorn on Wednesday, March 10th. Shows will commence at 8 A.M. and sales at 11 A.M. each day.

The bulls will be examined by a judging committee and any that are considered unsuitable will be removed from the sale. Every Ontario resident who buys a bull will be eligible for a premium equal to one-third of the purchase price but not exceeding \$150.

Recommend Advisory Board To Ensure Care Of Cemeteries

Appointment of a three-man advisory board to advise the Minister of Health on requests for establishments and enlargements of cemeteries and related matters, was recommended in a report to the Ontario Legislature from the Select Committee on the Cemeteries Act and related matters.

The committee, appointed last April, also urged legislation to name provincial field officers for inspection of cemeteries, safeguarding plot holders, the obtaining of accurate records and control of prices of services and supplies in the cemetery including interments, disinterments and foundations, markers, and other common needs at a rate in keeping with those of other comparable cemeteries in other localities.

Adequate provision should be made for creation of perpetual care funds for the maintenance of all cemeteries in the future, the report states, and adequate supervision by the province should be maintained over all such funds and securities.

Surveys should be made as soon as provincial field officers are appointed to determine the problem of neglected cemeteries and it is believed that an educational campaign with guidance from provincial field officers will go far to eliminate the problem in other localities.

The committee commends "those county councils, other municipal bodies, religious organizations, clubs, and other voluntary agencies for the encouragement and assistance they have given to the maintenance of old burial places."

Immediate action should be taken to put into effect recommendations in the report on cemeteries operated from time to time by religious organizations, and the appointment of personnel for supervision of the maintenance of old burial places.

"There does not appear to be any marked desire at present for some religious groups to establish cemeteries, if other means can be found to provide these facilities," the report states.

"Deaths in the province now approximate 65,000 a year. As the province grows more land is required to provide burial space, more attention is needed to maintain the grounds, and the problems of administration need critical review from time to time in order to determine what is best suited to the needs of the province."
