

The per centage of A Grade hogs across Canada dropped for the 8th year in a row and last year was the first year that Ontario had less than 30 per cent A's. Perth was the leading hog producing county with 162,483 hogs to its credit. There were six counties with over 100,000 hogs marketed last year. Waterloo county had the highest per centage of A's with 34.9 per cent. Only 13 counties had over 30 per cent in the top grade. Haldimand was not one of them. In 1946 there were 25 counties with over 40 per cent.
