Conservatives Will Name Candidate Next Monday

The 24-member C.C.F. group in the House of Commons lost their right wing last week.

Rose Thatcher's abrupt departure from C.C.F. Party ranks to sit as an independent member of Parliament for Moose Jaw - Lake Centre is still the principal topic of conversation on Parliament Hill.

This move was inevitable, because for some years now the ardent left-wingers among the party's M.P.'s had been uncomfortable about the presence in the party ranks of Rose Thatcher.

In many policy fields Mr. Thatcher had been in open disagreement with his colleagues called it open rebellion - for a long period. Periodically he angered and horrified other C.C.F. M.P.'s by soundly abusing some of the party's sacred cows.

The conference followed the usual procedure, the first day being open to the press and public, when briefs were presented by each of the 10 provincial premiers. There were no explosions, no walkouts, and little excitement. The current whisper in Liberal quarters is that Prime Minister St. Laurent's health - far from good - is such that he may be expected to lead the party into and through the next election.

Five Teams Enter Floodlight League

The Haldimand Floodlight league will get underway the week commencing May 16th, which is earlier than usual, and will include five teams. The teams are: Selkirk, Fisherville, Jarvis and two from Simcoe.

This was decided at a league meeting held in Selkirk on Monday night. The two teams from Simcoe will be additions to the league, while Fisherville, which played last year, has dropped out.

The application of the two Simcoe teams was considered by the league on Monday night and the league was unanimously approved. The teams are entering the league under different D.A.S.A. classifications. One Simcoe team will be Intermediate "B" and Jarvis will also be in the classification. The other Simcoe team will be Junior "B". This team won the Provincial Championship last year. Solihuk and Waterloo will likely enter in Intermediate "C" and "D" respectively.

Rev. W. E. S. James Is C.C.F. Candidate

The Reverend W. E. S. James of Normandale was nominated as the C.C.F. candidate in the riding of Haldimand-Norfolk in the forthcoming provincial election, bringing the number of C.C.F. candidates now nominated to approximately sixty.

In accepting the nomination, Reverend James said "I am pleased and honoured to represent the C.C.F. because it is a party with high Christian ideals. It is a party that will devote itself to the welfare of the people of Ontario as a whole and not just to certain segments."

He continued, "I noticed recently a press statement in connection with the riding which referred to the C.C.F. as 'the unemployment minded C.C.F.' and I take this as a direct compliment to the party. Certainly more than the Federal Liberals nor the Provincial Conservatives of Ontario seem concerned over this ever-increasing problem. The reduced buying power of the unemployed city or industrial workers has a tremendous impact on our Canadian farmers - it has caused a reduction of over five hundred million dollars in the national farm income. If the farmer can no longer buy, the farmer ceases to exist."

He expressed his sympathy over the difficulty young farmers have in establishing themselves on the land and pointed out that "A C.C.F. government would extend and liberalize the present system of farm loans and lower the interest rate."

"When Mr. Frost states it would be necessary to impose a 3 per cent sales tax, in addition to personal income tax, to finance a Provincial Health Plan, he was not entirely accurate. It is true Mr. James continued, "that this would be necessary under the financial policy of either Conservative or Liberal Government, but under a C.C.F. policy of diverting to our provincial treasury the profits of our vast natural resources from the mining and lumbering companies now stripping our province of its wealth for personal profit, a health insurance plan could and would be established at reasonable premiums to all Ontario residents."

"I cannot help but be highly amused when I read about Mr. Farquhar Oliver, Liberal provincial leader, running around the country-side assuring us that his party will provide on a provincial level the social welfare that the Federal Liberals, with their much greater tax resources, either find it impossible or refuse to grant. Mr. James concluded "All Mr. Oliver's huffing and puffing is merely a frantic effort to blow the breath of life into a dying Liberal party. It won't be too long before the total collapse of the Liberal party in Ontario will leave the voters only two choices - Conservative for the wealthy and C.C.F. for the rest of us."
