### Ottawa AS I SEE IT

John A. Charlton, M.P. for Brant-Haldimand

Never before in the history of Canadian Parliament has an Opposition won such a complete victory over proposed Government legislation.

Government tactics are often very confusing but this to me is almost unexplainable. For ten days the Conservative Party has fought against the Rt. Hon. C. D. Howe permanent powers under the Defence Production Act. We did not object to the powers in times of emergency, and even under existing conditions. What we did object to was that these powers were to be bestowed upon the Minister, or unknown Minister of the future, permanently. Quite unexpectedly, as soon as the vote was taken on an amendment, the Minister of Finance rose from his place and moved that "the question be now put". There was a dramatic moment before the Opposition, by various means, voiced its disapproval against such a local and unusual procedure. In speaking those five words "the question be now put", the Government was defeated.

## Council Considering Pond As Water Source For Fires

The lack of adequate water supplies in the event of fire was the basis for considerable discussion at the regular meeting of the Village Council on Tuesday night.

The present tanks are located behind the L. G. Holmes store on Main Street, at the rear of the Landy & Henderson Used Car Lot on Talbot Street and at the rear of the Presbyterian Church.

The proposal favored by council was to excavate a large pond about 100 feet long by 40 feet wide and 3 feet deep, located so that adequate protection would be available for the business section at all times.

The matter of a suitable location will have to be looked into.

If such a pond is dug the earth could be used as a fill for a new entrance to the park from Main Street. The present entrance is anything but satisfactory and the fill from such an excavation could be used to advantage at this point.

It was estimated that the cost of providing a pond of this size would be about \$1,000 and \$1,500, and it was felt that such an expenditure would be justified inasmuch as the value of the property would be protected.

## No Change In Strike Picture

A report from Cayuga says there is no change in the strike situation concerning the employees of the Haldimand Road Commission.

The men have been idle for almost six weeks with their income out of. For the same reason the work of maintenance and construction on Haldimand County Roads has been neglected.

The road employees demand union recognition. This they have offered a bargaining procedure between the employees and the county without union recognition.

This offer was not acceptable to the employees.

The majority of members of County Council appear to be against union recognition and indications are they will continue that stand indefinitely.

The council points out that the employees have been discharged and say this is verified by the fact the majority of the employees have picked up their unemployment insurance books. Some, however, have not been picked up.

It is rumored that the striking employees are drawing some union pay, although insufficient to meet their ordinary living expenses.

Neither side has submitted any press releases as a means of keeping the public informed as to what is going on.

In the meantime there is growing dissatisfaction throughout the County in the knowledge that these differences have continued so long. The County is not used to labour strife and there is no occasion for such a condition to exist. No doubt both sides now desire to save face and such an attitude will not contribute to an early settlement.
