Popular Local Athlete Victim Of Stark Drama On Lake Erie

Clifford Weaver, 31, of Nanticoke, father of three young children was drowned when the fishing boat "Irac" was swamped a short distance from the end of Long Point on Saturday. Two other members of the crew, Pat Fehrman, co-owner of the tug with Weaver, and Bob Hamilton, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Hamilton, were picked out of the swirling water through the quick action of the crew of the tug "H. H. Misner" which was standing by.

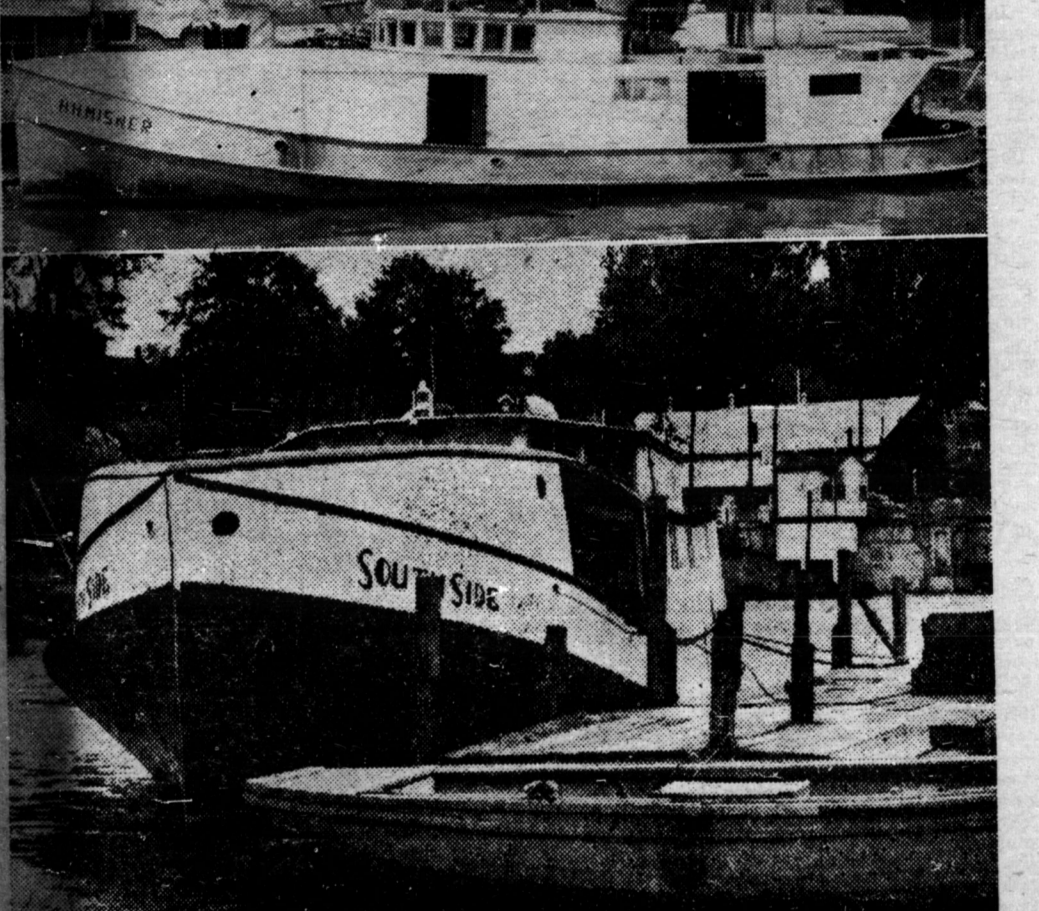
The tug "Irac" was being towed at the time by the tug "Southside" captained by Cecil Martin, of Port Dover and had already travelled about seven miles through the rough lake water when the boat was suddenly swamped forcing the three crewmen to take to the water.

The tug "Irac" had left port at Nanticoke about 8:30 A.M. on Saturday morning in an effort to bring in their nets ahead of hurricane "Connie". The nets had been picked up as well as a fairly heavy catch of fish when engine trouble developed.

Cecil Martin, Captain of the 60-foot fishing craft, "Southside" said he picked up distress signals from the "Irac" at 11 A.M. When he reached the boat south of Long Point it was shipping water and the engine was dead. A 200-foot nylon tow line was fastened to the "Irac" and crew members managed to pull Pat Fehrman and Bob Hamilton from the water. The search for Weaver continued for some time before finally giving up. It was thought he may have become entangled in the wireless aerial on the ship and was pulled down with her. The depth of the water at the point of sinking was said to be 114 feet, the tow line to the "Southside" was cut and a buoy attached to the end so that the ship could be later located.

The drowning victim was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joel Weaver, of Selkirk. He was raised in the Selkirk community and moved to Nanticoke following his marriage to Madeline Hedger, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Hedger, of Nanticoke. Besides his wife and parents he leaves three small daughters, Sharon 7; Gail 6 and Marie, 10 months. He also leaves seven brothers and three sisters: Vernon, Leslie, Cecil, Glen, Russell, Charles and Don Weaver.

Clifford Weaver, through his activity in Sport, was well known from Port Maitland to Port Burwell and it can be said that no young man so well merited the high esteem and affection in which he was held.

Whether in work or play Cliff Weaver applied himself with courage and determination. He never asked for favor and took the bumps of life in his stride. Only the night before the tragic accident he participated in a softball game in Simcoe and, as on many other occasions, led his team to victory. But whether he won or lost he never wavered from the rules of good sportsmanship.

Life had always been a challenge to Cliff Weaver and the pattern he set for himself had always been one to draw the admiration of his fellow citizens. In a few years, had his life been spared, he would have firmly established himself in the fishing industry. Following his marriage he in company with Pat Fehrman, his partner, purchased the fishing tug "Irac." Since going into business the road had not been an easy one. Hurricane "Hazel" brought losses at a crucial time in the process of becoming established and it was the determined effort to save their gear that took the tug "Irac" out in the Lake last Saturday.

Cliff Weaver would be the last one ever to ask for or look for help from anyone under normal circumstances — but the circumstances are not normal. The taking of his life last Saturday spared, he would have been in the community which demands a medium of expression. And what better way could that feeling be expressed than by contributing to a fund designed to alleviate in some small degree the weight of responsibility which is now the burden of his widow.
