

Stage 4—The Grievance Committee may take the matter up with the County Council, at which time the written statement or grievance and decisions in the shall be tabled. An Officer and/or a Representative of the Union may be present, and failing settlement within three (3) days, then,
Stage 5—The matter will be referred to an Arbitrator appointed by the Minister of Labour whose decision will be final and binding on both parties.

Any and all times fixed by th Article may, at any time, be extended by Agreement in writing betwee the County and the Union.

Group and General Grievances will be submitted at Stage 3.

Article 6. Seniority and Job Postings

Prostings.

(a) Should circumstances require a reduction in the working forces temporary employees shall be laid off first and then starting with those off first and then starting with those with the least seniority.

(b) Any new or vacated job in the County will be posted for a period of seven days to allow present employees to apply. Qualifications be ing equal seniority shall govern the filling of such jobs with a probationary period of thirty days allowed for one promoted to prove efficient.

(effective January 1st, 1956)

Employees shall receive the day off with pay for the following Statutory Holidays: New Year's Day, Good Friday, Dominion Day, Labour Day, and Christmas.

Employees shall receive the day off without pay for the following days: Victoria Day and Civic Holidays.

Article 8. Vacations With Pay.

(effective January 1st, 1956)

(a) Employees with one year of service or more shall receive one week's vacation with pay.

(b) Employees with five years of service or more shall receive two weeks' vacation with pay.

Article 9. Safety.

(a) First Aid Kits will be supplied by the County and kept in places easily accessible to all employees.

(b) No employees shall be required.

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
