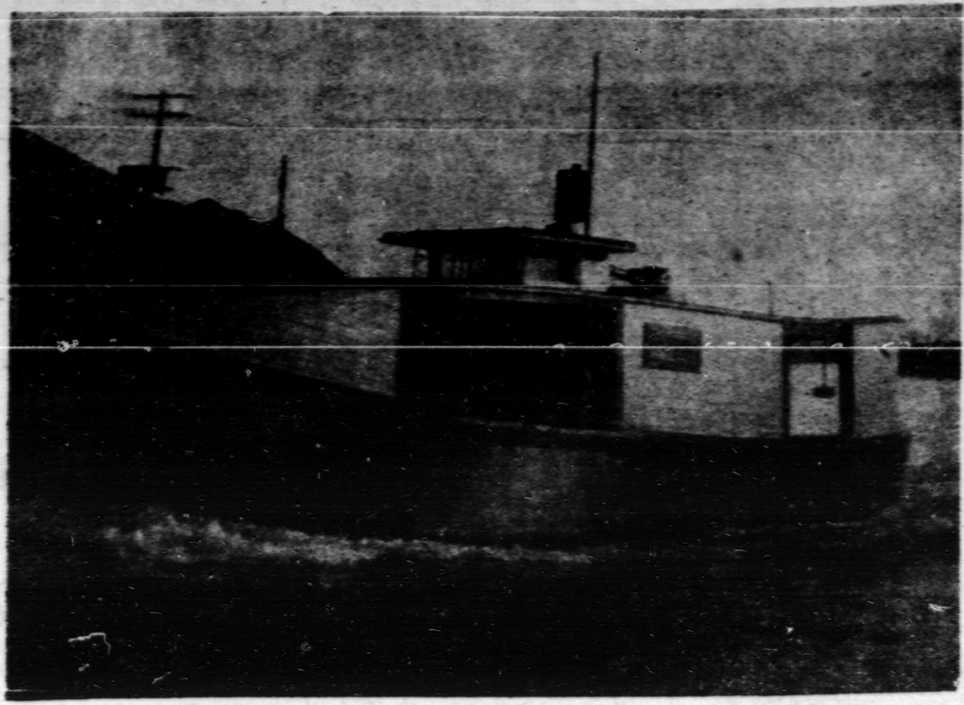


THE FISHING TUG "IRAC"

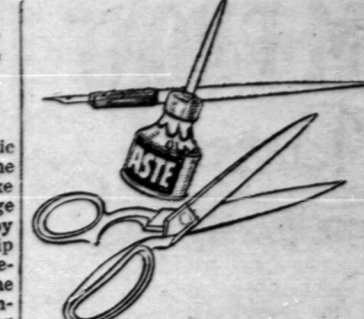
ANGELICAN CHURCH NOTES

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(g) The Union agrees that the County has the exclusive right and power to direct the work of the employees, to hire, promote, demote, lay-off, suspend or discipline employees in a manner consistent with the general purpose and intent of this Agreement. (h) The County agrees that an employee who lodges a grievance as set forth herein. (i) Employees' Responsibilities. (j) It is recognized that the County provides services for the safety, health and comfort of the citizens. Therefore, the employees must be prepared at all times to be available to assist in providing these services. (k) The responsibility to the citizens to provide the services being mutual to both the County and the employees necessitates that any difference of opinion of the interpretation of the terms of this Agreement will be settled in an orderly manner.
