A class of Guernsey Cows was judged at the farm of Bill Oster and Ayrshire Cows at the farm of George Lint, both of Cayuga. L. B. Mohlenbacher & Son of Koller provided classes of Yorkshire Sows and Market Cattle. Shropshire Swine were provided by W. E. Dasher & Son of Fisherville.

## NECESSITY OF EDUCATING FOR TOTAL ABSTINENCE

At the 55th Annual Convention of Haldimand and Norfolk Women's Christian Temperance Unions held in First Baptist Church, Dunnville, on Monday, May 9, the guest speaker,

Miss Edna Grant, of Toronto, gave a very encouraging address on her field work for the Toronto Council of W.C.T.U.s. Although almost without sight, Miss Grant had addressed or taken charge of 310 meetings during the past year, over half of which had been with children or mothers.

She stressed the work of educating

for total abstinence, the social service work with those who had already fallen victims to drink, and the evangelistic work of showing that only when God rules the life is it safe from evil habits. In regard to the first, she told of children's meetings for teaching the harm of strong drink and of mothers' meetings where mothers

enrolled their babies as Little White Ribboners, promising to do their best to keep the little ones from the drink habit. She told of visiting Mission Bands and C.G.I.T. Mother and Daughter leagues of in-teresting the young people of Bible schools in taking up temperance work. In dealing with the women in Mercer Reformatory are there because of strong drink. To show what the Gospel of Jesus Christ can do to break the drink habit, she told of a visit to the Harbour Light Corps of the Salvation Army in Toronto.
