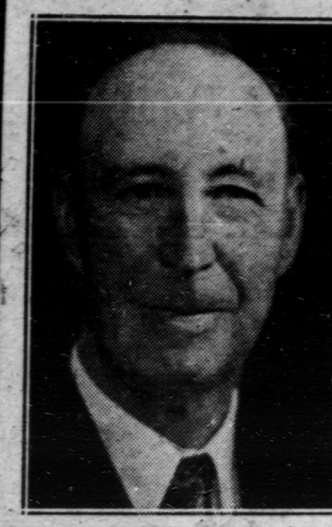

CCF POLICIES Will Result in SECURE Farm Incomes



ELECT REVEREND W. E. S. JAMES IN HALDIMAND-NORFOLK

Prosperous farms make a prosperous nation. CCF farm policies will give farmers secure incomes by giving them some control over the prices of the products they sell and buy. These policies include: guaranteed forward prices; effective marketing legislation; aid to farm organizations in setting up co-operatively owned storage and processing plants; removal of monopoly control in the farm implement, fertilizer and meat-packing industries.

SOIL SENSE

Have you stopped to think lately, are you getting the best results from your cropping system on your farm? Probably your next question would be, What have you to compare your yields with? For this reason the following table is presented. It shows the main crops grown in Ontario with the average yield for Haldimand County and for the Province of Ontario. The yields are all in bushels per acre, except for the last two mentioned, which are hay and corn silage, estimated in tons per acre:

Crop	County Average	Provincial Average
Fall Wheat	34.0	34.0
Oats	36.1	38.5
Barley	29.4	32.8
Mixed Grain	36.6	42.1

Much of the phosphorus is locked up by nature thus it is difficult to

leak out. Nature allows small portions of the phosphorus to become slowly available in a form which plants can use. If the plant root is not close enough to use the just released phosphorus, it is promptly fixed again by the soil. Thus nature supplies just enough phosphorus for the crop to grow, but still this is often not enough to obtain a bumper crop or high yielding crop which is demanded of our soils today if they are low in phosphorus. It is for this reason that phosphorus is required to be applied, as nature can not release or supply what it lacks.

It has been estimated that up to fifty per cent of the total phosphorus in the soil is present in the organic matter. Since the topsoil contains practically all the organic matter, it is all the more important that the topsoil be conserved.

Plants well supplied with phosphorus grow rapidly, have good root

development and mature early. A proper balance of all the various raw materials or plant nutrients is required for the best production possible.

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Ontario's farmers SHARE A BILLION DOLLAR BUSINESS AIDED BY GOOD GOVERNMENT

More than a billion dollars worth of farm products have been sold by Ontario farmers in each of the last three years—nearly double the output of ten years ago

Development of new crop varieties and thorough extension work under the present administration has expanded cash crop acreage in Ontario by more than 400 per cent

Departmental herd improvement policies have

maintained livestock output at 70 per cent of Ontario farm income.

The Frost administration has introduced the most advanced marketing legislation of any Canadian province.

Community living in rural areas has been bettered through Frost government grants. Last year these amounted to a quarter of a million dollars for 108 community centres

UNDER THE FROST ADMINISTRATION SOUND LEGISLATION HAS BROUGHT BENEFITS TO ALL ONTARIO FARMERS:

- **HERD IMPROVEMENT** has been encouraged through the Frost Government program which pays farmers one third the purchase price of all thoroughbred sires. Grants to date amount to \$56,000.
- **LIVESTOCK LOSSES ARE REDUCED** by provincial government provision for Warble Fly and vaccination against Brucellosis.
- **CHEAPER FEED** for livestock is demonstrated through five pasture improvement stations established under the present Government.
