HIGH TAXES HIT THE FARMER - -- By Lewis Milligan -

"ALL TAXES must, at last, fall upon agri-culture." So said Edward Gibbon, author of The Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire. Gibbon spent his life on that great historical work, which is for the most part a study of the science of government. Agriculture is a basic industry, indeed it is the basis of all industry. since the entire population depends upon the farmer for its very existence. And yet the farmer is usually the last man who is thought

of in the imposition of taxes on other industries. More than ever, in this age of mechanical and scientific farming, the welfare of the farmer is directly and indirectly affected by taxation. An illustration of this was given recent-ly in a statement issued by H. G. Hilton, President of The Steel Company of Canada, referring to the reduction in the corporation tax by the federal government. Mr. Hilton mentioned several items, such as cold rolled steel and galvanized sheets, which he said would be reduced \$5.00 per ton as a result of the cut in taxes. He pointed out that galvanized sheet prices, for instance, are of particular interest to the entire farming community. These sheets are used in the fabrication of farm buildings, in culverts and drains, and the aggregate rural demand for that product is a substantial part of the total. This is not to mention farm implements of all

kinds which are entirely made of steel.

In his statement, Mr. Hilton said that the resultant tax savings accruing to the company would be passed on to the steel consumers, and this promise was now being implemented. Cheaper steel would mean lower prices for the essential materials in the making of household appliances, such as refrigerators, stoves and washing machines, and place the manufacturers of such goods in a better position to compete for markets at home and abroad. SOILS FIELD DAY TO BE HELD AT RESEARCH STATION VERNON NIE FARM TO BE

pasture irrigation and soi, fertility plots, crop rotation plots.


It is well known that the Haldimand clay soil as mapped in Haldimand, Welland, and the adjoining counties occupies an area readily accessible to large metropoiitan markets and favoured with a climate suitable for most farm crops.

However, this soil presents a variety of problems to the farmer and the Regional Research Station established in South Cayuga township is an attempt to find an answer to such questions as: What kind and amount of lime does the soil require? What

questions as: What kind and amount of lime does the soil require? What type of fertilizer gives the best results? Is there a place for irrigation on clay soils? Are soil conditioners prractical? and Does deep tillage pay off?

Nine acres of land are devoted to the tillage experiments where studies are underway to measure the effects of tillage on crop yields, soil moisture and soil acration. Three tillage practices are being compared tillage practices are being compared including the mouldboard plow, chisel plow, and the subsoiler with mould-

The lime project includes the testing of two kinds of limestone at various rates of application. Soil fertility plots, crop rotation plots, and irrigation plots are also included in the work being done at the station. Friday, July 8th, should be a big day for the farmers in Haldimand and the surrounding counties. Every farmer is urged to make a special effort to attend.


