

The blast results from an instantaneous release of immense energy by fission and fusion of atams. It produces extremely high temperature within a few millionths of a second in the form of a ball of fire. Its light has been estimated to be about 100 times that of the sun.

Where the fireball touches the ground the surface becomes highly radioactive for a considerable time and almost everything, including great chunks of earth, is pulverized. The fireball may be three miles across. It sucks up the pulverized material possibly 70,000 feet in the air. It

ial possibly 70,000 feet in the air. It is this pulverized, radioactive material which may be carried by the winds over areas 150 miles long and the smellest area of occupied agriial possibly 70,000 feet in the air. It is this pulverized, radioactive materwinds over areas 150 miles long and 20 miles wide, or bigger, and then settle to the earth, contaminating all it touches. This is called fall-out.
