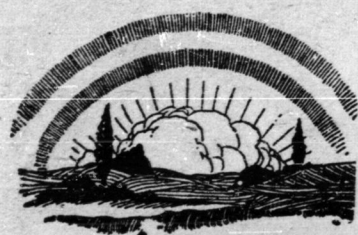

On the Farm Front

Up to the middle of December there were 323 veterinarians in Ontario who had signed agreements with the Minister of Agriculture under the Brucellosis Act, 1956, and 13 of these are located either in Haldimand County or in the immediate vicinity. All of these 13 are prepared to take care of the vaccination of calves in the county when called upon to do so. As has been announced, Haldimand County has been declared as a "supervised area" and when the provisions of the Act have been met the most of vaccination will be borne by the Department of Agriculture. Remember, too, it is the duty of the cattle owner to notify the veterinarian when he has calves of the right age to be so treated.

Dr. John N. Welsh, chief cerealist at the Cereal Breeding Station, located at Winnipeg has just recently been honoured for his work in developing the Garry oat. He received a citation at a seed growers meeting at Cornell University in New York State. It is pleasing that a Canadian would be so honoured. Actually, Dr. Welsh is the originator of the older variety, Alaska, as well as the other variety, Rodney that has proven to be very satisfactory under Haldimand conditions. In the test work conducted in this county again this year, Rodney oats topped the list.

Poultrymen will be interested in a new circular that has just been issued by the Ontario Agricultural College and entitled "Ventilation in the Poultry House." It has, of course, long been known that ventilation is one of the most important factors in the proper management of a flock and much has been written and said about it. Here, in concise form, is gathered together the latest and most up-to-date information on the subject. Be sure to get a copy from your agricultural representative.

The movement of herd cattle to farms and feed lots is continuing at a rather high rate. So far, the increase has not been any reason for concern. During November the increase was 10 per cent. The figure for the 11 months ending with November 1956 has been reported as being 10 per cent. This can only result in heavier killings of slaughter cattle during late winter and early spring.

For the ninth consecutive year P. Watson, Live Stock Commissioner for Ontario will present his "Annual Outlook" at the annual convention of the Ontario Soil and Improvement Association to be held during the last week of January. This is always a highlight week. One-half day is being devoted to Farm Business and a full amount of time will be given to a discussion of soil problems, problems such as getting seed, distribution of new varieties, driers, etc., will also be discussed. The dates are January 28 to 31st inclusive.

Have you started to look for your supply of seed for 1957? If you have your own, it is a start being made on getting cleaned up and be sure to run amination test on it.
