



FEDERATION FACTS

A meeting of the Bruce-Niagara County Inspectors was held at the Rural Youth Centre, Kober, on Thursday evening, Dec. 15th. Dr. Harold Worthing, Provincial Veterinarian for the Health of Animals Branch of the Department of Agriculture, was the guest speaker.

He gave a very informative address and left no questions unanswered concerning the administration of the Bruce-Niagara Control Act. He explained that in the United States during 1955 30 million dollars would be spent on the control of Brucellosis (Bang's Disease) and that several of the states now carry legislation to the effect that all milk sent to the dairy must come from Brucellosis Free Herds. He further stated "this one of legislation will eventually spread to Ontario, so let us be prepared for this imminent step."

The inspectors will eventually call on every farmer's first time around they have been instructed to make a list of the calves between 6 and 9 months of age and then send a copy of the list on to the v-trins-dan preferred by that particular farmer. A BANNER YEAR

Canada is closing a year marked by unprecedented prosperity and expansion.

With a population of nearly 16,000,000—an increase of 4,000,000 in 10 years—the Dominion in 1955 either embarked on, or finished a variety of multi-million-dollar projects. Virtually every province shared in the development and even a sketchy outline is impressive.

Newfoundland, celebrating a century of self-government, will spend millions on the exploitation of Labrador's natural resources and plans to revamp the province's fishing industry.

Prince Edward Island marked the centennial of its capital, Charlottetown.

Two great projects were completed in Nova Scotia—the Canso Causeway linking Cape Breton Island to the mainland and the Angus Macdonald bridge joining Halifax and Dartmouth.

New Brunswick embarked on construction of the \$20,000,000 dam and power project, said to be the biggest engineering scheme in the province's history.
