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#### On The Farm Front

While total crop production for the province, as reported by Dr. Huntley at the Crops Annual Meeting last week at the Rural Youth Centre, is down by \$3,000,000.00 the farmer's outlook is not as gloomy as it might seem. This is contained in a report by Dr. Huntley. In the total value of all field crops for the year 1954 amounts to \$4,210,250.00 while the same figure for 1953 stands at \$4,543,100.00 which is an increase of slightly over \$300,000.00. In other words this country was not as badly hit as some others in the province.

A new list of varieties with a brief description of each of them is now available and you can copy from your agricultural representative. This covers most of the cereal grains such as wheat, oats, barley and soybeans and in addition includes many of the newer types of forage crops. While reference is made to the corn crop in this publication more complete information as to the varieties best suited to this region is given in another circular that has just been revised and is now ready for distribution. It is entitled "Selected Corn Hybrids for Adaptability and Maturity" and is known as circular No. 70. It is dated "January 1956" which means it has just come off the press. If you are growing corn either for ensilage or for grain you should have a copy.

Income tax time is fast approaching again and the necessary forms are now available from your postmaster. The 1955 edition of the Farmer's and Fisherman's guide has also been issued and if you haven't a copy be sure to ask for one. It is based on the T-1 General form which is to be used by most farmers. This guide sets out in a very clear way the procedure to be followed in taking advantage of the various schemes that are available. Be sure to get a copy the next time you are in your Post Office.

Don't forget that winter care will increase the life and usefulness of farm machines. In actual practice farm equipment will deteriorate as much or more from poor storage and care during the winter than it would from regular use. Get those machines under cover and see that they get a good cleaning and repair job done on them.

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#### CROP GROWERS REPORT

**A SUCCESSFUL YEAR**  
The 17th Annual Meeting of the Haldimand and York County Agricultural Association was held at the Rural Youth Centre last week with a large attendance of members and guests. Mr. Ken Anderson, retiring president, welcomed those in attendance and referred briefly to the various projects which have been undertaken during the past year.

The report of the Secretary-Treasurer went into more detail and gave some actual results from Rod Rod Tests, Drill Width Tests, Variety Tests, etc. The Financial Statement indicated that the Association had closed the year with a reasonably good cash balance.

The special guest speaker at the Monday luncheon was Dr. D. N. Huntley, Professor and Head of the Department of Field Husbandry at the Ontario Agricultural College, Dr. Huntley took as his subject "What's New in Crop Production?" and he referred to the newer varieties of all kinds of crops that are now available. He made the prediction that farmers will likely be faced with far more new names of varieties in the future than they have in the past.
