An amendment to the Highway Traffic Act which becomes effective February 1, 1956, makes it an offence to pass a stopped school bus.

ON AND AFTER FEBRUARY 1st when a motorist overtakes a school bus which

> • is marked on the rear SCHOOL BUS DO NOT PASS WHEN BUS IS STOPPED and Red, Rear, Flashing Lights are operating and

• is stopped upon a highway outside a city, town, village, police village or built-up area for the purpose of receiving or discharging school children

he shall STOP his vehicle and SHALL NOT PROCEED

• the school bus resumes motion or

• the driver of the school bus signals him to proceed or

• the flashing signals are no longer actuated.
