## James G. Morrow Elected President of C.I.P.A.

Mr. Morrow, P. Eng., M.B.E., President of the Canadian Institute of Professional Engineers, was elected to the presidency of the C.I.P.A. at a meeting held in Ottawa in September. Mr. Morrow has been closely associated with the C.I.P.A. since its inception and was largely instrumental in the strong attempt made to standardize the work of the Canadian and American Authorities. In 1948 he was elected to the presidency of the C.I.P.A. His activities during World War II were varied, the most noted being the development of "Morrow" Steel, which made possible the piercing of German Tank armor. From 1939 to 1945 he held the position of Technical Advisor to the Government Steel Controllers and as such suggested many improvements resulting in the greater output of much needed and important steels.
